Minister Musings

This month the members of UUFB will have the opportunity to practice one portion of our Fifth Principle, the portion which speaks of the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large. After the service on May 19 we will hold the second Annual Meeting of this year. The UUFB Bylaws state: "Annual Meetings shall be held to adopt the annual budget, usually in January, and to elect the Board of Directors, usually in May." This meeting will determine those who will carry on the work of the Board in the coming year. There may be other items of importance and interest on the agenda as well but selecting the new Board members is the top priority.

In order to do any official business at this meeting a quorum of the membership will either need to be in attendance or have signed a proxy so someone present can represent them. As I am sure many of you have noticed, our membership continues to grow. And that growth means that the number of people needed to reach a quorum grows with it. At our Annual Meeting in January the quorum was 72 and it will likely be slightly higher for this meeting. I want to encourage all of you to either attend or sign a proxy so we can do the very important work that is on the agenda for this meeting—selecting new Board members.

There is another annual meeting occurring in late June that I know at least a few members, friends and staff of UUFB will be attending. From June 19-23 the General Assembly (GA) of the Unitarian Universalist Association will be occurring in Spokane, WA. Spokane is probably as close as GA will ever get to Bozeman, a mere 5 hour and 40-minute drive from here. While UUFB Annual Meetings typically draw fewer than 100 people, GA draws 1,000, 2,000, or more UU's from across the country as well as from other countries. I will be going and I look forward to seeing Fellowship members, friends and staff among the throngs of UU's who will be there with us. If you are thinking about attending or just have questions about GA, let me know. I would be happy to either talk to you about what I have experienced and learned about GA or to recommend others in the Fellowship who have been to previous GA's. No two are alike and everyone has so many events and activities that it is impossible to attend everything that a person might be interested in.

This year UUFB is hoping to view some of the "live-streamed" events at GA in our new home. If you can't make it to the church for any of these "showings" you can watch a number of GA events on your computer by opening links on the UUA website via your computer or smartphone. And if you can't go to Spokane but want to participate in as much of GA as possible you can register as an off-site participant which will give you access to a majority of the scheduled events.

Annual Meetings, whether of our Fellowship or of our national body, the UUA, are opportunities for us to engage in listening, learning, and sharing the experience of community building. It is my hope that those of you who are currently unsure about attending one or both of these Annual Meetings will decide to participate as you are able. Your participation, both in our Fellowship and in the larger UU movement, makes a positive difference in the communities we are a part of.

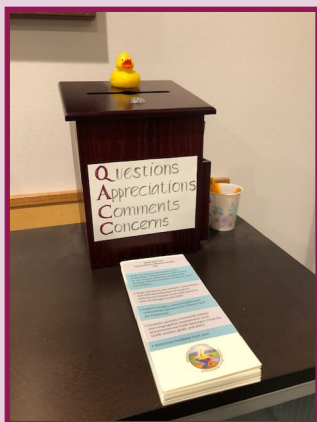

Governance and Leadership

UUFB is heading into the end of the Program Year for 2018-2019, with the Annual May Meeting (Semi-Annual Meeting?) fast approaching on May 19th. Our new Governance and Leadership Committee has been working diligently to help the Board come up with new candidates for various opening positions to be voted on by the congregation at the May meeting. In addition to nominating Board candidates, the Governance and Leadership Committee is also helping fill a shared position for UUFB Volunteer Coordinator for Family Promise and is looking for members for our recently formed Personnel Committee. After these challenging start-up tasks, we hope the Governance and Leadership Committee members can take a breather, then begin work on helping the Board with leadership training, starting at our Board Retreat in June.

Rev. Duffy and Board President Tonya Stevens continue to benefit from every-other-Wednesday evening Zoom calls with leaders of other congregations of the Pacific Northwest. In addition, retired Rev. Mary Wellemeyer (she visited us last year and gave a service) has set up a Zoom call for Board presidents of all Montana UU congregations to come together on April 30. These Zoom calls (which are video conference calls) emphasize our interconnectedness with UUs throughout the region. They may well be the springboard to regional social justice action.

Program Council April 14th

The Program Council is made up of the chairs or representatives of all UUFB standing committees (uufbozeman.org/members-friends/committees) plus representatives of some of the task forces as well. At the last Program Council meeting, the Committee on Ministry (COM) took the lead in educating us about the changes we are undergoing as a growing congregation. They propose to visit each committee separately in the next months for discussion about this issue as a first step towards helping us all “switch gears” mentally from belonging to a Family-sized congregation to becoming a Pastoral-sized congregation. For the many other members and friends who are not part of a regular committee, the COM is working on hosting other venues through which the congregation can engage in healthy discussions about who we are now and who we would like to be in our new size. COM will continue to lead discussions at the next several Program Council meetings.

Two Services Task Force – April 9th

We had the first meeting of this group on April 9, it is comprised of Angie Howlett and Jack Day from LRE committee, Robyn Lauster from Hospitality and Membership, Sandra Oldendorf from the Sunday Services committee, Tonya Stevens from the Board, Dave Rockafellow from Committee on Ministry, and Duffy Peet, Minister. Initially this task force will try to determine what the tipping factors will be for UUFB holding two weekly services. We will consider these factors and more: number of people in the sanctuary? In the parking lot? Or changing characteristics of the congregation? Then the group will identify what the second service will look like: would it be the same service back to back with the first on Sunday? Would it be the same later in the afternoon or evening? Should it be a different service entirely? How will this affect all the committees who help with services? We will be doing outreach to the congregation in the next year to hear all opinions.

Interior Design Working Group

Member Barbara Turner-Lantz, in her capacity as a cabinet maker and installer, has been helping review the long-ago-created plans for cabinets to line the UUFB back hallways. The Capital Campaign budget will be used to buy and install cabinetry sometime this summer.

AV installation

We received an estimate from Poindexter's and voted to accept that bid. We can begin Phase I of AV installation. Once the final cabinetry price has been determined, the Board will know what we can spend on the rest of the equipment we have on our wish list, including hearing assistive devices, speakers in the Social Hall, and a headset microphone.

Inviting Our True Intention

“Three things cannot be long hidden: the sun, the moon, and the truth.” —attributed to the Buddha

I call the tall bush on my back patio “Burning Bush” because in autumn its leaves are a fiery red. All winter long I overlooked three uninhabited nests inside of it. For months and months I could have perceived—but didn’t—what was in plain sight.



I was delighted to finally see them today, but not surprised. In the summer, I enjoy watching birds fly into and out of the leafy-branchy mass, catching glimpses of them hopping from ground to woody perch and back again.

I’m curious—and a bit embarrassed—that I hadn’t noticed the nests until now, springtime, when the branches are about to burst forth with green.

I called my partner over to point out the carefully crafted twigs, each a purposeful home, one with a bright green strip of discarded plastic cording as decoration. He, too, is delighted. He, too, had not noticed them.

What else is there in this world that my hustling and bustling have barred me from sensing and seeing? What else has my oblivion—self-induced or socially-constructed—hindered me from perceiving?

My guess is that it is not only delights, such as these nests but violence, too, that’s within perception’s range, if only I gave it my true attention. Acts of exclusion, discrimination, and the impacts of systemic oppression are all there, right before me. I don’t always perceive them—I have been taught to not see them—but they are there, nevertheless.

What else have I missed as I move through this world? How might I wipe the dust clouding my vision and be available to reality as it is?
