Minister Musings

The entire month of December is typically considered to be "the holiday season." The season starts with Thanksgiving and continues through New Year's Day. It is a time of expectation and excitement, of gatherings and gaiety, and of endings and beginnings. It can be easy this time of year to get caught up and swept along by all of the activity. It might be beneficial though to step back and slow our pace, at least periodically. And while we slow down momentarily, we might consider what makes the holiday season significant for us.

During this holiday season I will be taking time to be mindful of what I am thankful for. Those of you who heard or read my sermon of November 24 got a small sampling of my thankfulness for this Fellowship and how it has made a significant difference in my life. And as the annual pledge drive wraps us, I am filled with thankfulness for the commitment and generosity of the members and friends of the congregation for your generosity. Without your ongoing financial support, much of what we do would not be possible.

I will also be taking time this month to contemplate the underpinnings of at least some of the holidays of the season. As the month progresses and darkness increases I will remember that on the Solstice a turning will occur. The day of the Solstice, when there is more darkness than any other day of the year, I will take time to direct my thoughts inward. I will ask myself what seed is quietly nestled deep inside of me preparing to crack its shell, sprout, grow and bear fruit. Often the Solstice is a time when snow and ice covers the ground and much of what was vibrant and green just a few short months ago is now covered or frozen, apparently dead. But the seeds of life lie hidden under the frozen earth preparing for the days ahead.

And on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day I will contemplate the birth of a babe in Bethlehem more than two centuries ago. From my biblical studies I am confident that Christmas Day is not the actual date when Jesus was born. For me, that isn't really the point. What matters is that I take the time to remember a number of things. First, that a birth, every birth, is a wondrous occurrence. Second, that every babe that is born is not just a child their parents but of something far greater than I can possibly comprehend. And third, that the predominant message of Jesus' words and life was to love one another. If we could open our hearts to love one another as a parent loves their infant, the world would be a far better place for all of us.

Then, on New Year's Eve and New Year's Day I will be thinking about what is ending and past, as well as what is about to begin. I will be asking myself what it is that I need to let go of in order to allow the seed that is within me, waiting to burst out of its shell, to develop to its fullest potential. Just as important as asking the question will be to set aside quiet time to listen and watch for the answer.

So this holiday season, I hope you are able to enjoy the best that the season has to offer. May you make time for fun and frivolity, joy and merriment, as well as quiet and peace. Most of all, may you feel loved and may you share the love you have within you with those you meet along life's journey.

The Guest of Grief

Ever since the beginning of this school year, I've had a hard time getting ready in the morning. Hard time getting out of bed, unfocused, glued to my phone, just wasting time generally. I've easily recognized that this is weird behavior for me—I'm a morning person and a go-getter overall—but couldn't put my finger on why I was doing this.

This morning, it finally dawned on me: it's grief. I've been unconsciously grieving the fact that my daughter no longer needs my help getting ready for school. She gets up by her alarm, gets dressed by herself, makes her own breakfast and lunch, and heads out the door on time and walks to school by herself.

Since she was in kindergarten, she and I have always gotten ready together, in mirror fashion, doing the same things at the same time so that she could develop an independent routine (and so that I didn't spend mornings yelling at her). It was just easier, with one kid, to do everything together. That's not happening now, and it probably won't ever again. I hadn't really processed what that means until now.

On the one hand, it means freedom: sleep later! do yoga in the morning! leave early and have coffee out somewhere! I'm looking forward to a time when I can embrace those possibilities. But first, I need to feel this grief, embrace it for a while, and then think about what life will be like as she grows in independence and wisdom. I need to think about letting go gracefully.

Sometimes grief sends notice ahead of time; sometimes, it shows up as an unwelcome, uninvited guest. Either way, I know, in my head, that grief always has love in its suitcase, and if I let it, it will unpack that love for me to look at and admire.

A Montana native, Emerson attends Middle Creek Montessori, is an active 4H'r with a large flock of chickens, turkeys, a cat, a dog a Conure, fish and two horses, Ginger and Snip, and is a longtime Irish step dancer. Her distant relative is Ralph Waldo Emerson although she's mildly disappointed he didn't write any graphic novels.

Sally Russell



I am a descendent of European-American homesteaders to Eastern Montana in the latter half of the 19th century. My parents ventured a little further west and met in Chemistry Lab at Montana State College in Bozeman in 1953, and their chemistry was so good that six little Russells came along, including myself. I was born in Butte, graduated Bozeman High in 1976, then left home to pursue my dreams. It was not my plan to end up off the road system in the rural Alaskan indigenous community of Bethel, raising two boys as a single parent in a 625 square-foot home without piped water and next to a crack house, running a sled dog team and fishing, and learning about parenting from Yup'ik Elders. But I wouldn't trade that experience for the tidy life I had planned: being married to a doctor,

teaching at a university, and living in a comfortable house in a safe neighborhood near Seattle. After 26 years in Alaska, I retired in 2019 and moved back to Bozeman to be in the beautiful Rocky Mountains, spend time with my 85-year-old mom and be closer to my siblings. I anxiously await the arrival of grandchildren, conceived now only in the minds and hearts of my boys and their committed partners.

I was raised Catholic, but now I can't recite the "Apostles Creed" without questioning most every line. For example, has Jesus really "ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of God the Father"? Could he have descended into mother earth instead? Is he really sitting down? Does he ever sit on the left side? How do we know God's gender? And don't get me started on the Virgin Mary. I'd rather enjoy it if she was a scorned unmarried mother who got back at everyone by giving birth to the Savior of the World via the traditional method of conception. I value having a mind of my own while trying to understand the teachings of the great mystics like Jesus, which makes me not really in the Catholic mold. I have been moved to tears in repeated UU services this Fall, from the music, the homilies, even the personal sharing during "Joys and Concerns", and I'm inspired by the community's commitment to Social Justice and inclusion. I'm grateful to have found this Fellowship in Bozeman!

Environmental Tips

IDLE FREE BOZEMAN

If you're going to be stopped for more than 30 seconds (except in traffic), Turn Off Your Engine!

Facts on Idling:

- Chemicals from exhaust are harmful and can aggravate asthma, emphysema, and bronchitis, especially in children and the elderly.
- Idling pollutes the air outside and inside your vehicle.
- Most people waste 1-2 full tanks of gas every year by idling.
- Idling for 10 seconds uses the same amount of gas as restarting your car.
- Turn the vehicle off if you anticipate 30seconds of idling to balance the cost of starter and battery maintenance with fuel savings.
- Manufacturers assure that frequent restarting won't harm an engine.
- Avoid idling more than 20 seconds because excessive idling can actually damage your engine:, says the Ford Motor Company.
- It is illegal to leave an idling car unattended in Montana (MCA 61-8-357).
- US drivers waste 6 billion gallons of gas every year by idling.

WHAT ABOUT WARMING THE ENGINE?

- When the temperature is above freezing, most modern vehicles do not need to idle. At 0-32 degrees F, just 30 seconds of idling is a good rule-of-thumb. In extremely cold weather (below 0 degrees F), 1-3 minutes of idling may be necessary.
- At all temperatures, driving slowly for the first few minutes is good for your car and it's the only way to warm the transmission, wheel bearing,s differential, and other moving parts.
- Always make sure your windows are clear before driving.
