Minister Musings ~ Rev. Duffy Peet

As I write this article in the final days of February the snow is falling outside my window. Last month I wrote about the unseasonably high temperatures during January and the low snowpack in the valley. What a difference a month can make. We now have ample snowpack and the temperatures have been more seasonal. As February draws to a close and March approaches, I find myself thinking about spring and looking forward to the equinox that will occur on March 19th.

You might wonder what has me thinking of spring in the midst of a February snowstorm. As I sit watching the snow I feel concern for the daffodil sprouts at the front of the church which I noticed as I was greeting people coming to the February 23nd service on resilience. The snow has me wondering how resilient the new sprouts will be. I imagine they will be completely covered by the accumulating snow. I also think about some of what I shared during that service. Resilience is something that is needed during challenging or difficult times. Spring can be such a time. Spring is a season of promise and often also of challenge and difficulty. The new sprouts clearly recognize the promise as they reach toward the life-giving sun. They also face the challenge of the elements, such as the snow that is currently falling.

As March and spring approach, I am also thinking about both the promise and the challenges that are present for our Fellowship. Many of you have likely noticed that there are quite a few new faces on Sunday mornings. Like the daffodils at the front of our building, both our Sunday morning attendance and our membership have been growing. The Board has paid attention to the growth we have been experiencing. They also realized that unless appropriate planning was done, we could soon find ourselves having difficulty adequately accommodating the numbers of people who want to attend our services. We recently came very close to having that occur. At the January 26th service we were nearly at the building capacity limit of 162 set by the City of Bozeman. We would have gone over that limit had just ten more people showed up for the service that morning. And for January and February our average attendance has been such that the sanctuary has been 80% or more full for six out of the eight Sundays. The Board exhibited important foresight last year when it established a task force to consider how we might address both the promise of our increasing numbers as well as the challenges those numbers pose.

The Two Services Task Force has recently submitted a report to the Board. Their report contains options which would be important for us to consider. As the name of the task force implies, one of those options would be for the Fellowship to begin holding two services. This is something that was done when we first moved into the building prior to the remodel. Now, just four years later, we are again looking seriously at the possibility of two services. I have heard people express concerns about taking such a step. Doing so would involve significant changes and would hold challenges. My hope is that we, like the daffodil sprouts poking through the ground, can find it within ourselves to focus first and foremost on the promise that the changing season and our increasing numbers offer. And that we can be resilient in dealing with the challenges that will certainly lie before us. As spring approaches, I am grateful for the promise of new growth and the new life that will come with it.

For those of you who are retired teachers, or grandparents who are missing your grands because they don't live here, working with our children in RE can be a delightful experience.

The children's curriculum follows our theme, so in Feb. we talked about resilience. They shared when they had had a hard time doing/learning something. They do Joys & Concerns and then have an activity. The kids share materials with each other and help clean up at the end of class.

The best part is that Beth Witte, our RE coordinator, plans the whole thing! She sends you the lesson and then you can choose how you want to participate. I read the story each week, and the Book With No Pictures was a big hit.

I chose to do every Sunday in Feb. so I would get to know the children and they now know me. But if one Sunday a month is your preference, I'm sure that will work too. Our children are our future, so please invest in them!

Board Highlights for February 2020

The UUFB Board had a full agenda in February. Here are the main items we reviewed:

NEW UUFB VISION DRAFT

First drafts and discussion of our 2020 Vision Statement were brought to the February Board meeting by Neil Gregersen and Jack Fisher of the Vision Task Force (which also includes Mariah Rundberg and Andrew Kestley). We are amazed and grateful that UUFB is home to such considerate and talented individuals who have studied and distilled a ton of survey data to a few paragraphs identifying our hopes and dreams. Round two will be coming in March, then we hope to have a Vision statement for the congregation to vote on by the Annual Meeting on May 17th.

TWO SERVICES TASK FORCE FIRST REPORT

Have you noticed the popularity of many Sunday Services? So have we! Last spring a task force was formed to address the increase in attendance on Sundays, sometimes to the point that parking is an issue as is chair space in the Sanctuary. Representatives from the committees whose personnel would be most affected if UUFB were to begin to offer two services per week make up this group: Sunday Services Committee, Lifespan Religious Exploration (LRE), Hospitality and Membership, and the Committee on Ministry. They sent their draft report to the Board in February and are currently working on incorporating Board comments into their final recommendations. Early advice includes forming two new groups: one to work strictly on our parking situation and one who will provide coffee/cleanup so Hospitality members may spend time with newcomers instead of being in the kitchen.

INTERIOR DESIGN – AUDIO/VISUAL

Paul McVey (Board Member-at-Large) and Mike Clark continue to work with Poindexter's on supplying hearing assistive devices at UUFB. The Board has also asked the company provide an estimate for **video cameras** to be mounted alongside the current projector. We are contemplating the use of these to provide a livestream of our service and/or broaden our service into the Social Hall and project video and audio in there to accommodate more people.

Mike Clark remains busy enhancing the lighting in the back of the Sanctuary by replacing bulbs with brighter LEDs. He will be needing volunteers to help him with this task.

EXTERIOR DESIGN

The Board voted to accept the Social Justice Action Committee's proposal for a flagpole in front of UUFB to be erected as soon as weather is good. Thanks to Kitty Donich for researching/writing the proposal.

PERSONNEL

The former Coordinator of Religious Exploration (CRE) Search Committee has agreed to become the Search Committee for the Religious Exploration (RE) teacher. Beth Witte, CRE, is working with Rev. Duffy on RE teacher duties and will be meeting with the Search Committee once those details are hammered out. The Board along with LREC continues to work on how we will hire childcare providers to be available for events and meetings.

LEGACY PLANNING WORKSHOP

A big thank-you goes to Peg Wherry for arranging a free Legacy Planning Workshop for interested UUFB members! This workshop was given by Marsha Goetting of the MSU Extension Office on February 22nd in the UUFB Social Hall. Dr. Goetting held a group of 24 people in rapt attention for 3 hours on a Saturday morning, entertaining us even while she made devastatingly clear that everyone needs to make sure their affairs are in order before they die.

Off-site registrants are able to watch and ask questions in live sessions, including select workshops and business sessions. Off-site Voting Delegates are also able to propose amendments in the live business sessions, participate in debates, and vote in general sessions.


