MINISTER MUSINGS

REV. DUFFY PEET

I am writing this newsletter article while in the midst of attending UU Ministry Days and UUA General Assembly (GA). Since both were also held exclusively online last year the organizers have had both experience with, as well as considerable practice time related to, holding these events online. That said, just as we at UUFB have found with our online worship services, sometimes the technology doesn't always work as we expect or want it to. Even though there have been technological issues, both events have provided me the opportunity to learn, to share with others, and to be involved in the decision-making process of the larger UU community.

Because UU congregations are few and far between in Montana and surrounding states, I find it both personally and professionally important to connect with others in the larger UU community. Attending UU Ministry Days and GA gives me opportunities both to connect and to get a sense of the size and the diversity within Unitarian Universalism. There were nearly 600 UU ministers who attended UU Ministry Days. And as I write this article over 3,500 UU's from across the country and around the world are registered for GA. Attending these two events allows me to get a broader perspective of the concerns and issues UU's are focused on and dealing with.

One of the major issues UU congregations are focused on is how to cope with the impacts of the COVID pandemic. In my discussions with UU ministers, I have learned that trying to determine how and when it is safe and appropriate to return to in-person gatherings is a significant concern. From the conversations I have had it is clear that most UU congregations in this country continue to hold Sunday services exclusively online. On June 6 our Fellowship resumed in-person Sunday services and children's RE. In doing so, our Fellowship became part of the minority of UU congregations who are providing opportunities for congregants to physically gather together for services again after more than a year. The resumption of in-person services has not been and likely will not be for some time to come either simple or easy. There are many issues that need to be considered as we strive to ascertain what is safe and appropriate. And there are multiple changes that need to be made from how things were done in the past. Because most UU congregations have not yet resumed in-person services, we aren't able to learn from the experience of other congregations.

As our Fellowship continues on the path to resuming meeting in-person, we will be doing so the best way we figure out. I am sure there will be times when we don't take into account all of the variables we should. There will be times when we will make mistakes and have to change course. There will be times when some people will feel discouraged, disappointed or otherwise upset with some of the decisions that are made. All of this is to be expected because we don't have a clear or definitive map to follow as we move forward. We know where we want to go but we don't know for certain the route to take or the timing of when to take the next step. My hope is that as we continue along the path, we will all seek to share our thoughts and feelings with one another as we have compassion for each other. Together, with grace and humility, we can find our way along the uncharted route to where we want to be in the future.

BOARD REPORT







The new program year began on June 1. The 2020–21 Board has lead UUFB through the many challenges of this pandemic year. The Fellowship remains strong, standing for our principles, and we are now getting back together in some kind of normalcy. This is, as they say, "one for the books."

The old and new Boards officially transitioned at the June 14 meeting. With the new year, Sara Williams and Paul McVey stepped down as at-large members, and Peg Wherry moved from Board President to Past President. Sally Russell remains Board Secretary, Janine Roberts continues as Treasurer, and Valley Peters is our remaining Member-at-Large. We welcome Jeanne Moe taking her place as Vice President.

The bylaws require that we have 6-8 Board members. With Jeanne as our only new Board member, we are now at the minimum. We are looking for at least one more at-large member to provide a fuller representation of the Fellowship.

The new Board will continue to address the challenge of resuming in-person services and children's Religious Exploration. We know that covid is not yet vanquished. There is still risk, and the Board will continue to place the safety of members, friends, and the larger community as the highest priority. Thanks for your patience as we try new approaches and figure out how to proceed safely.

Fall Retreat. Several members and friends are working now to ensure that we have a fall retreat this year. Tentatively, the retreat will happen in early September with reconnecting as the basic goal. Planners include Carolyn Widman, Adrienne Wallace, Heather Watson, Sandra Oldendorf, Susan Backer, and Diane Knipfer. We will need many more hands to see this off. If you wish to be involved, please contact me or one of these folks.

Why did I volunteer? The Governance and Leadership Committee recently asked me why I volunteered, as part of their assessment of leadership. I had to think a little bit, because this certainly has been a challenging year. What possessed me to volunteer, anyway?? There were really two reasons: first, to serve the Fellowship, and second, to serve myself.

I want to contribute so this Fellowship survives and thrives. I value our faith community (even though as a humanist the word "faith" comes from my lips reluctantly), and I see the UU path as one that benefits our society in many ways. We have a lot to offer.

I also saw serving on the Board as a way of challenging myself, proving to myself that I was capable of doing this work. And I wanted to take my mind away from issues of the world that I increasingly found difficult to deal with. Over the last few years, I was getting too engrossed in politics, lost in the divisions that we now have in our country. I found myself following news reports too closely, getting angry about things outside of my control. I was responding to too many urgent requests for financial contributions. I decided this was bad for my health, mentally and physically, and wanted to get my mind off of all that. Getting more involved in the work of the Fellowship helps a lot.

And I also figured that by contributing my energies as a Fellowship volunteer I might release others for work in the outside community, those whose passions and energies are up to those challenges. This is my way of contributing to YOUR activism and work for justice.

As we reconnect in the Fellowship, I hope you too will consider volunteering. Serving on a committee or task force, or simply volunteering for a one-time opportunity will not only help the Fellowship but can help meet our personal need to serve.

HOUSING FIRST VILLAGE

The celebration for the Housing First Village fundraising effort was held on Friday, June 25 in the parking lot at the Warming Shelter. About 30 people attended from many different congregations.

The highlight of the program was the presentation of a check for \$139,614 to Heather Grenier, director of HRDC. A small portion of this amount came from two second Sunday offerings at UUFB. There were gasps of surprise and then much applause as everyone realized what this means for the village. All of us were amazed and pleased at the amount of money raised by the faith community of Gallatin valley. A media video of the celebration can be viewed at the KGBK website.

Connie Campbell-Pearson, who spearheaded this effort and was the driving force behind this effort, spoke briefly of the importance of this project to protect the most vulnerable in our community. She read the names of the six homeless persons who died during the last year for lack of a safe, secure place to live.

By mid-summer, the first 12 houses will be completed and set on foundations. The remaining 19 homes will be finished by volunteers with the help of construction foremen from the community. Every congregation will be asked to help with this effort, likely to happen in September and October. The first occupants will be in their homes by Nov. 1, 2021.

The occupants of these homes will be screened by HRDC and have to met certain criteria. Plans for the whole site include a garden area, places for people to gather and chat, and access to services such as job training, peer counseling, and yoga at the Warming Shelter.

HISTORY CORNER

Gay Pride Parade 1997 - A Proud Moment for UUFB

In a UUFB history from 1980 through the 1990s, Sara Williams wrote: "...Another highlight of the year was the Gay Pride parade in 1997. Under the direction of the gay community in Bozeman and the state of Montana, the Fellowship came together and was instrumental in the implementation of weekend events. UU minister, Rev. Amanda Aikman, from Everett, WA was in Bozeman and facilitated several of the weekend activities."

Two active UUFB members, Donay Hansen and Shaun Phoenix, were very involved in planning the activities and reached out to UU minister Rev. Amanda Aikman to attend and lead some of the events. The social/political atmosphere in Bozeman was very intense leading up to the celebration and the parade with anti-gay letters to the editor and marches down Main street. Shaun Phoenix wrote a guest columnist piece published in the Chronicle, asking for civility during the parade and weekend.

Meanwhile, the more liberal churches in Bozeman sponsored an event, advertised and open to the public, to state each denomination's stance on gay rights. Although it was sparsely attended, it was a great privilege to share the Unitarian Universalist position and actions. Here are a few of them:

- -1969, following the Stonewall Inn raid, the 1970 General Assembly of the national UUA passed a resolution affirming the rights of gays, lesbians, and bisexuals and calling for educational programs and nondiscriminatory hiring within the UUA
- 1975 the Office of Gay and Lesbian Concerns was established
- 1987, the General Assembly voted to initiate the Welcoming Congregation Program to help congregations examine personal conscious or unconscious homophobia, look at using inclusive language in our programming and worship services, and examine the special issues of gays, bisexuals, and lesbians within a congregation.

Thankfully, the weekend came off without any incidents. Many of us UU's, along with Methodists, Congregationalists, Episcopalians, and others who had been trained by the Bozeman Police Dept. as "Security", walked as a buffer between the sidewalk and the parade participants. Rev. Aikman held marriages and led our Sunday service, which was attended by many participating in the Gay Pride Weekend.
