

# MINISTER MUSINGS

REV. DUFFY PEET

As I write this article at the end of October, I am thinking about the holiday that comes near the end of November, Thanksgiving. I am thinking about Thanksgiving a month early for a reason. With all of the challenges and struggles I and we are facing, I sometimes find it difficult to focus on what I am thankful for. From conversations I have had with some of you, I am reasonably sure I am not the only person having trouble focusing on what I have to be thankful for.

As I have mentioned in sermons I have given as well as previous articles I have written, giving thanks is a spiritual practice that I have engaged in for many years. The spiritual practice of giving thanks can be relatively easy when life is going smoothly. When life becomes less stable or certain, however, such as over the past year and a half, giving thanks tends to require more attention, concentration, and commitment. It is during times like these when giving thanks becomes more than just something that is a polite or good thing to do. It becomes a full-fledged spiritual practice that has deeper meaning and value.

When we are in the midst of challenges and struggles, we tend to focus what we perceive to be problems or even possibly threats. Focusing attention and energy on problems and threats is a built in survival mechanism—a survival mechanism that has served our species well over the course of time. While this survival mechanism has benefits, it also has deficits. When problems or threats persist for an extended period of time, as has been the case since early last year, the continual focus on problems and threats can deplete us. Over time, we become physically, emotionally, spiritually, and psychologically drained. It can seem like we are trying to fight our way out of quicksand. The more we work to get out, the deeper we sink. We can become so drained that we may find ourselves unable to function well or adequately in any number of situations. We may feel fatigued, generally pessimistic, or much more doubtful or uncertain than is typical for us. All of these are signs not only of stress but of distress, which can have significant negative impacts on our lives.

The survival mechanism of focusing on problems and threats, while beneficial in short-term situations, can become destructive in ongoing, long-term situations such as we are in now. None of us can solve the problem or eliminate the threat of the COVID virus. In order to replenish ourselves, we need to find ways to shift our focus. This is where the spiritual practice of giving thanks can be of benefit.

When we set aside time every day to give thanks, we interrupt the survival mechanism tendency to focus on the problem and/or the threat. Instead, we focus on what it is that makes our lives possible, sustainable, and even enjoyable. The spiritual practice of giving thanks is like a rest stop during a long and grueling hike. Taking time each day, or even several times a day, to give thanks can allow us to catch our breath, cool our overheated body or emotions, and prepare for the next leg of the journey.

So as we enter the month that contains the Thanksgiving holiday, I would invite you to consider giving thanks more than on a single day of the year. I would ask you to take time, even if it is only a few moments each day, to think about what it is you have to be thankful for. Engaging in a practice of giving thanks won't solve all of your problems. It will, however, allow you to have more energy and more stamina than you would have if your focus is continually on the problems and threats in your life.

# BOARD REPORT

The Board has been busy this past month. Here are some highlights you should know.

#### Minister Transition

The Board held a Town Hall by Zoom on October 24 to discuss the process for minister transition and to address questions from the congregation. Amanda Cater talked about the process for finding an interim minister, while Peg Wherry focused on the search process for a settled minister. An important takeaway is that finding a minister is unlike any other hiring process: congregations "call" the minister, we do not hire them. To attract qualified candidates, both for the interim and settled minister positions, the Board has authorized raising the minister to a full-time position. Notes on the town hall will be available on the website.

#### **New Covid Policy**

The Board approved a new Covid policy on October 20. When the pandemic began it was easy to imagine that we would soon be able to open the doors and have everything return to some kind of normal. Instead, we see the numbers going up and down, then up again, then down... To set a more definite standard for decision-making through these potential ups and downs, the Board approved a UUFB Pandemic Protection Policy, setting criteria under which we can open for Sunday services, how we can use the building for meetings and events, and how to address RE programs. The policy uses data and categories from CovidActNow, with minor modifications to suit our purposes.

#### **Building Closure for In-Person Services**

In keeping with the new policy, the Board has also decided to keep the building closed for in-person services until at least January 2022. It is the Board's strong desire to give Sunday Services and RE committees and staff enough advance notice so they can plan the services. As I write this, Gallatin County Covid numbers seem to have hit a sort of plateau, bouncing up and down within a consistent range. The numbers are still well above where they need to be to resume in-person services safely, but vaccination is finally blunting the peaks.

#### **Stewardship**

Our Stewardship Pledge Drive was introduced at the October 17 service by Tonya Stevens, who gave a wonderful and personal account of why UUFB is worthy of our financial support. Janine Roberts, UUFB Treasurer, followed up with another great stewardship moment on October 24 describing our financial situation and the goals for 2021. Look for the announcement of stewardship cottage meetings coming soon to the listserve. The pledge packet will be in the US mail shortly.

# A Thousand Voices By Rev. Tania Márquez

Every year around this time, there is a distinctive smell in the air and the trees sway like the whisper of a thousand voices. That's how I know they are coming. At that point the perpetual altar in my heart begins taking place outside of me, for a few days, and it dances with joy at the thought of their coming.



The stub of a lit taper candle burns brightly on a bed of cempasúchil, or Mexican marigolds.

First, the table that will be the altar. A few boxes on top to create different levels. I begin to think about the pictures I am adding to my altar today; the beloved friend who didn't get to say goodbye, the one I loved, my grandparents, the cousin who left too soon. I allow myself to think about the ones whose pictures won't be on my altar, but that I still remember.

The fragrance of the cemapsúchil fills the air; Grandfather Sun-made flower, a ray of light guiding them back, calling them home. It is a long way here. It is good to have some food and drinks ready, so they may quench their thirst, so they may eat and gain strength for the way back. I love adding chocolate and drinking chocolate caliente. I imagine a moment of communion that transcends the world of the living.

Once the altar is ready, I behold the sight of this place of encounter: they will come and will know they are missed. All of the times we spent together, all of the memories come rushing to us. Our elders told us, "To remember is to live again." And that's what we do when we allow ourselves to be surrounded by their presence and the stories of times we spent together.

My family and I gather. We tell stories, we laugh, we also cry a little, we rejoice in their company. Their stories come alive in our telling, and so does the love we still feel. I have learned to listen more often to things than to beings; to listen to my heart that knows a different way of knowing. My heart knows that the dead aren't really dead; their stories are perpetually being told by the world around us; like trees swaying, like the whisper of a thousand voices.
