MINISTER MUSINGS

During this holiday season, I am thinking about the multiple holidays it includes. The holidays my family celebrated each year during this season included Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's Eve and Day. But there are numerous other holidays I wasn't aware of in my youth, holidays from religious traditions that few if any people in my small hometown observed. Three of these holidays include the Jewish holiday of Hanukkah, the Buddhist holiday of Bodhi Day, and the Pagan and Wiccan holiday of Yule. And today, there are holidays that hadn't even been established when I was a youth. Two of these are Kwanzaa, which honors African heritage, and Chalica, which is a UU holiday that focuses on our Seven Principles.

So this year I am thinking about each of these holidays. I am thinking about each of these holidays in an effort to attend to gem or gems that each one has to offer us. During this cold and dark time of year, we may benefit from focusing our attention on those gems these holidays hold that provide us with hope and inspiration.

The gem of the first holiday of the season, namely Thanksgiving, is evident in this holiday's name. The gem is giving thanks. But in order to genuinely give thanks we must first recognize what it is we have to be thankful for. This holiday invites us to explore all aspects of our lives to first discover the gems that are present and then to acknowledge our gratitude for the gems we find.

The holiday of Christmas holds numerous gems, depending on one's perspective about Jesus and what his life means for our own. For me, I look to one of the teachings he is reported to have shared. That teaching is stated twice in the Gospel of John. In both verses Jesus tells his disciples that he is giving them a new commandment. The commandment he gives is to "love one another." If we could find it within ourselves to love one another the world would be changed into a place of sparkling diamonds everywhere we look.

Like Christmas, Bodhi Day holds many gems. For the Buddhist devotee, the Nobel Eightfold Path delineates what is required to end suffering. The end of suffering is something that all of us would wish for. Along with the Nobel Eightfold Path, the four divine abodes hold gems for anyone who is willing to seek them. These divine abodes include loving kindness, compassion, sympathetic joy and equanimity. How much better would all of our lives be if we could live these gems in our daily lives.

Hanukkah celebrates the rededication of the Holy Temple in Jerusalem after it was overtaken and desecrated in the 2nd century BC. This holiday reminds me that it is important to attend to and properly care for those places in our lives where we seek and find spiritual sustenance. Without such places, we may find ourselves feeling disconnected from the guiding principles and values in our lives.

Which brings me to the holiday of Chalica. Chalica originated in 2005 and is a weeklong celebration of the Seven Principles as set forth in the UUA Bylaws. These Principles speak to the values that Unitarian Universalism holds dear. By living into these values as best we are able, we strive to make life for all people in the world more meaningful and more fair.

Whatever holiday or holidays you celebrate this time of year, I hope you find the gem or gems that are there and share the beauty and radiance of these gems with those you encounter.

BOARD REPORT

Annual Meeting

The Board set our Annual Meeting for Sunday, January 23 after services. We likely will meet by Zoom, although a final decision has not been made. At this meeting members will vote on a budget for 2022 and perhaps other issues to be announced. Stay tuned for details.

Stewardship Campaign

The stewardship campaign is wrapping up. As of this writing, we are at 86% of the pledge goal with 83 forms returned. Board members will follow up to complete the canvas. We are hopeful the goal will be met to allow UUFB continue to meet the opportunities of 2022.

Cottage Meetings

Many members and friends took part in the stewardship cottage meetings, which were as much about getting together and talking about the Fellowship as they were about pledging. Attendees shared experiences that attracted them to Unitarian Universalism and UUFB. Comments like "I stumbled into my home" and "I found my people!" were echoed by many. "The welcome was genuine, and people could speak their real selves," spoke to a basic part of our community, what brings us together and keeps us here.


What can we do better? One person commented, "We don't know the children or youth of the Fellowship," and desires to see activities that will help bring the generations together. Several folks expressed a strong desire to bring RE back together with services soon, to attract and serve younger people and families with children. Several people commented on ways to reconnect with one another, perhaps adding pictures to the directory, getting together in small groups. People also commented that we could use the building better and that it should be an asset and not a burden.

The most common comment from members and friends was the need to get back together. Attendees were generally satisfied with live streaming – and certainly, it's better than no services at all – but said that we need to get together sooner rather than later. There is concern that the longer we remain isolated, the weaker the Fellowship will become. Most importantly, we have a deep personal need to be together. Live streaming only goes so far. The pandemic has taken a toll on us.

Pandemic, still

The building remains closed for in-person services until the end of this year. The Board has not yet made a decision beyond that point, although we are committed to give Sunday Services and other groups adequate advance time to plan services. As noted above, there is a strong desire in the Fellowship to meet in person for services and group activities. The Board is listening and continues to consider ways forward.
