The 2022 pledge drive is now complete with a total amount pledged at just over \$195,000. That is the highest pledge amount in UUFB's 60+ year history. That total is quite an accomplishment. What makes it even more amazing is that it has occurred in the midst of a pandemic when we haven't been able to meet in person for most of the past 22 months. Along with the amount pledged, the number of pledge units was noteworthy as well. This year we had just under 100 pledge units, which was more than last year and second only to 2019 when we passed the 100 mark for the first time. These numbers indicate that the members and friends of UUFB are committed to this Fellowship through good times and hard times, and are incredibly generous. It is common to use the words "thank you" to express gratitude and appreciation. In this situation, the expression "thank you" seems quite inadequate. You are an amazing group of people and I want you to know that I feel privileged to be your minister.

On Sunday, January 23, I attended the UUFB town hall meeting on Zoom where the 2022 budget was presented and discussed. About 45 people attended the meeting. A number of questions were asked and most of them were answered. I appreciated the interest and involvement of those who attended in looking at the financial spreadsheets that had been sent out. While I recognize that UU's in general tend to be avid readers, reading spreadsheets isn't high on most people's "favorite things to read" list. Thank you for taking the time to review the spreadsheets and to inquire about issues or items you found confusing or unsettling.

The next step in the Annual Meeting process is voting on the budget. In order to be counted, all ballots will need to have been mailed or delivered to the Fellowship prior to the time this article comes out in the newsletter. As Unitarian Universalists, we place a high value on the democratic method. We value it so highly that it is included in the Fifth of our Seven Principles. We believe that providing people with opportunities to participate in the decision making process is an important and very beneficial endeavor.

Sadly, there is currently a movement in the State of Montana as well as other states in the U.S to restrict people's ability to vote in public elections. As I stated in my sermon on January 16th, four such laws were passed and signed by the Governor during the last Montana legislative session. These laws will make it more difficult for some people to vote. Those who are most likely to be impacted include people of color and those who are physically and/or financially challenged. Those who voted for these laws claim that they will make our elections more secure. In reality, security was not an issue prior to these laws being written and enacted. That makes the stated intention behind these laws suspect. When we consider the impact of these laws it is apparent that certain people will have significantly more difficulty casting a ballot than others. And it is clear that a high proportion of those who will have difficulty casting a ballot will be Native Americans and other people of color. The question then becomes what is meant by "secure" elections. It would seem that just as was the case with "Jim Crow" laws in the South during the last century, Montana is taking steps to limit the ability of a specific portion of our citizens, those who are native to this land, to vote. As a faith tradition that values the democratic process, we have work to do to correct the social injustice created by these laws.

RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION

Now that church is back online, Religious Exploration (RE) will look a little different this winter. There is a combination of in-person outside services, some kid-friendly elements worked into the online service, and special events. I will be emailing parents directly with changes and updates. BOARD REPORT

2022 Budget – The Board has been consumed the past month with discussions of the budget. Our Treasurer Janine Roberts, Finance Committee chair Bruce DePriester, and committee members Paula Milano-Nielsen and Sharon DePriester have done wonderful service in preparing and sending the budget for review. There have been several rounds of revision, largely devoted to addressing budget shortfalls. We were quite pleased with end-of-year additions to the stewardship drive which allowed more flexibility in the budget and added significantly to our confidence that we can achieve our goals in 2022.

The January Annual Meeting was announced early in the month as a combination of a Town Hall by Zoom and voting on the budget by mail. Ballots are to be postmarked by January 31, and results will be announced early in February.

Town Hall – I want to thank everyone for the great questions during our Town Hall on January 23. I also am impressed that so many of us have learned to use Zoom functionality so well, raising our hands electronically and typing in the chat box. By the time the pandemic has eased up, we might all be Zoom experts.

Pandemic – Aside from the budget, the most important action coming from the Board was the decision to remain closed for in-person services until Gallatin County Covid numbers come down to the level given in our Pandemic Protection Policy. That is no more than 25 new cases per day per 100k population. We are currently a long way from that point, although the Omicron spike gives signs of subsiding.

February Board Meeting – One of my personal goals when I took the job of Board President, was to prepare Board agendas and distribute them to the congregation earlier than had been the custom. The congregation should be aware of what the Board is doing, of what activities are to be planned and discussed, and you should have a heads up on topics you might want to sit in on.

Many of you know that Board meetings are open to the congregation. Anyone who wants to attend a Board meeting can do so as an observer, with the opportunity to speak (within boundaries so we can complete the work). Simply let me know if you plan to attend and I can provide Zoom instructions.

With all that's been going on in 2021 and the new year, putting together agendas has unfortunately been a lastminute exercise. While I don't have a definitive agenda, I can tell you that the topics below are tentatively planned for our February 14 meeting. This is, of course, subject to change, as is everything in this wonderful new year of 2022.

- Establish a task force for a Planned Giving program
- Evaluate board goals 2021-22
- Flag policy
- Building security policy (door and security system codes)
- Pandemic issues in-person services and building uses

- March <u>2nd Principle</u>: Justice, equity and compassion in human relations;
- April <u>3rd Principle</u>: Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations;
- *May* <u>4th Principle</u>: A free and responsible search for truth and meaning;
- June <u>5th Principle:</u> The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large;
- *July* <u>6th Principle</u>: The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all;
- August <u>7th Principle</u>: Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are part.
