April 3, 2022 • "Reawakening our Roles as Compassionate Change-Makers • Guest Speaker: **Bonnie Sachatello-Sawyer**

MINISTER MUSINGS REV. DUFFY PEET



On March 20th of last month, which was the spring equinox, UUFB returned to in-person services and children's Religious Exploration (RE) in our building for the first time since mid-August of last year. About 45 people attended in-person that day. It was wonderful to have people physically present in the building again after preaching in a nearly empty sanctuary for many months. And from what I heard from those who were present that day, folks were very glad to be there.

Had this not been the weekend following spring break for local schools, it is quite likely the number of people attending in-person would have been higher. And the weather probably discouraged some people from attending in-person as well. That morning, the area was under a winter storm advisory with temperatures in the low 30's and several inches of snow falling just prior to and during the service. Because the weather was not at all inviting, the outdoor social time after the service was cancelled.

After more than two years of holding most of our services and children's RE online, the return to meeting in-person again was greatly appreciated. We made the shift to online services in 2020 when no other option was available or appropriate. Since then, the decision was made to continue live-streaming the services even after we were again able to meet in the building. That means people can decide whether to join us in the building or to participate in the service in the comfort of their home on Sunday mornings. This is an example of how we, as a Fellowship and UU's more generally, strive to offer people a variety of options. We recognize that each person is unique and has different wants and needs. While we can't meet all of the wants and needs of those who are looking for a religious home, we strive to make our Fellowship and what it has to offer accessible to those who are interested in connecting with and/or getting involved in this congregation.

With spring now upon us, I believe our efforts to resume in-person gatherings will be supported by the increasing length of daylight and warming temperatures. As I said during my sermon on March 20th, it is my hope, and quite likely your hope as well, that we will be able to hold in-person services and RE every Sunday from this day onward. Because the COVID virus is still with us, there is still much that is uncertain. In spite of the uncertainty, work is being done to continue moving in the direction of providing more opportunities for people to meet in-person, both in the building and outside.

In the weeks and months ahead, considerable time, attention and energy will be required as we work to recover and rebuild from the impact the pandemic has had on us as individuals and as a congregation. We are all long past the point of being ready for the pandemic to be a thing of the past. We have all experienced loss as a result of the pandemic. With the return to in-person gatherings, we are taking one step in the journey to recovery and rebuilding. Each time we gather in-person in the coming weeks and months we will have the chance to re-engage, offer support and encouragement, and re-imagine how we will be in community together. Just as spring weather is unpredictable on a day-to-day basis, so will our path forward be. But spring both demonstrates and convinces me that better days lie ahead. In the coming days, I look forward to the blossoming that will occur in our Fellowship and in gardens, fields and forests in the area.



We're back in-person!!

With UUFB returning to in-person services, we are also resuming Religious Exploration (RE) classes. For now, we will only have one large RE class for ages 2-12. Once we have a better handle on how many children are attending, their ages, and the availability of volunteers, we may split back into a nursery and school age program. For the time being, we are using the RSVP system (uufbozeman.org/rsvp), but feel free to drop-in if you happen to forget. Masks are still required (as age appropriate) and there is a HUGE air purifier in the large classroom. We're excited to see everyone again so please come join us on Sunday!

BOARD REPORT

We're Back!

The building is once again open for in-person services and small group meetings. Our first two services on March 20 and 27 were well attended, and several group meetings have been held in the building. The air filtration units are installed and working as intended, and RE is coming back with a good group of children on Sundays.

Snow inhibited gathering socially outside the building on March 20, but the weather relented and everyone enjoyed socializing with coffee and refreshments on the 27th. Thanks go to members of the Sunday Services, Hospitality & Membership, and Social Activities committees, as well as our minister and staff for making this work smoothly. And we greatly appreciate the contributions of our tech operators, Joy LaClaire, Carsyn Oetting, and Anna Jacobs who make it possible for us to continue live streaming services for those who are unable to meet in person.

In addition to opening the building, the Board approved a Covid Covenant listing expectations for meeting in person safely. The covenant and other plans for reopening were presented at a Town Hall on March 6. We ask that each member and friend make the commitment to abide by these expectations.

Thus far, the Board has voted to open the building with significant restrictions. In particular, masking is still required and there is no singing at services or social time inside the building after the services. It is tempting to declare "All Clear" and lift the restrictions. If the pandemic continues to moderate, easing restrictions will be on the Board's agenda.

Building Security

As noted In the March 6 Town Hall and recent emails, we now have a monitored security system in the building. Coinciding with this change, door codes have been reissued. Contact me, Rev. Duffy, or other staff if you need building access and have not yet received instructions.

Strengthen Community

The 2021-2022 Board set several goals for ourselves and UUFB when we started in June 2021. Of these, "Strengthen Community" stands out as the most important as we head into our "new normal" with less Zoom and more in-person connections. We need to restart groups that have been inactive for too long, add in-person sessions for RE, including adult classes, and anything else we can come up with to engage folks.

Your ideas for UUFB activities and groups are always welcome and encouraged. Reconnect and get involved.

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Minister Transition

The **Interim Minister Search Committee*** has been hard at work preparing our Congregational Interim Record. This Record will exist in a Transitions database maintained by the UUA Transitions Office. The survey many of you filled out in February has provided a lot of useful content for our Record, and we think we can project a reliable picture of our Fellowship. We hope to share this document with the Fellowship when it is finished.

The earliest date for those Records to be posted so interim ministers can view them is April 7, a deadline we hope to meet to create positive first impressions as early as possible. The deadline for the latest publication of Congregational Records is April 21. The UUA interim search timetable is available on the Minister Transition page of our website: uufbozeman.org/members-friends/minister-transition. (Check the 2022 tab at the bottom.)

Getting our Record published early will help prospective ministers meet their deadline for submitting their interest in specific congregations. We should get those names on May 2—and we do hope for the plural! We then have two weeks to study those ministers' records, check references, do Zoom interviews, etc. before telling the Transitions Office by May 16 our "yeses/nos/maybes." We can make our first offer on May 18, at noon Eastern Time. (There's clearly the possibility of competition between congregations!)

We will keep the Fellowship informed as best we can, though we will need to keep some information strictly confidential. The cohort of Interim UU ministers is small, and the Interim Search Calendar lists a meeting of the Transitional Ministers Chapter. So we need to respect their privacy—a minor breach of confidentiality for any applicant may quickly become known by others, to our detriment. So, curious though you may be, please don't ask us for details. And expect (virtual) busy signals if you try to contact us between May 2 and 16!

Settled Minister Search

At its meeting on March 14, the Board voted to create a Search Committee and begin the process to call a settled minister to serve with us starting in August 2023. The Board also approved a Minister Search Committee Policy. That policy is posted on the Minister Transition page on the UUFB website: uufbozeman.org/members-friends/minister-transition. Keep checking back to this webpage for additional updates on all search activities.

A call has gone out to UUFB members and friends to nominate individuals to serve on this Minister Search Committee, and the form is on the website. The deadline for nominations is April 10. Nominators will be held anonymous; every member or friend can make multiple nominations. And the same person can be nominated more than once. The most important qualification for serving on the Search Committee is deep commitment to the health and future of the Fellowship; Committee members must have the trust and respect of the congregation.

YUUR 7 Principles in Practice Slideshow

With the arrival of April, we focus on the third UU principle: Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations.

We continue to collect photos that exemplify our principles as they play out in our daily life. Spiritual growth may be a part of your everyday practice and also in other ways for us and our families and our communities of work and play. Let's share those daily practices through photos. Might it be yoga, music, studying, volunteering, or engaging with a youth or senior in your neighborhood? What spiritual growth do you enjoy?

The children's version of the third principle is: *That we should accept one another and keep on learning together*. Children are welcome to participate and can make a drawing of the principle if desired or take a picture of their parents and themselves engaging in an activity displaying our third principle.

"Spiritual growth isn't about a vertical ascent to heaven but about growth in every dimension at once. It's spirituality in 3-D. Growth in spirit doesn't measure one's proximity to a God above, but rather the spaciousness of one's own soul—its volume, its capacity, its size. We need souls that can take in the world in all its complexity and diversity, yet still maintain our integrity. And we need souls that can love and be in relationship with all of this complexity. 2nd Sunday Offering to Western Native Voice (WNV) - April 10

The Social Justice Action Committee (SJAC) has specified that the 4/10 offering will go to Western Native Voice (WNV). 
WNV is Native-led and has a presence on all the Montana reservations. To counteract the antidemocratic voting bills passed by the state legislature in the last session, they are placing kiosks around the state wherever Natives will likely be able to access them. These kiosks offer an easy opportunity to register to vote. Each kiosk costs about \$1,000 with a small amount of travel, not to exceed \$200, for staff to install them.

SJAC feels that since the congregation expressed a commitment to support Montana Native communities; and of course, we support democratic procedures, including the right of all to vote; and also in honor of Earth Day, we consider the Native vote essential for the good of the planet, the goal of paying for one kiosk would be an attainable and admirable goal: \$1,000-1,200.
