MINISTER MUSINGS



REV. DUFFY PEET

With my retirement from ministry approaching, there are some realities that I am needing to attend to. For example, this is the next to the last article I will write for the monthly UUFB newsletter. As my retirement date draws closer, there are fewer and fewer opportunities, as your minister, for me to communicate with all of you, whether through the newsletter, sermons, emails, phone calls or in-person meetings. And as the opportunities I have to share with you decrease, there are topics that I recognize I need to speak to.

One of those topics involves the changes that will occur at midnight on June 30. I say changes because there will be several. The most obvious change is that I will become your former minister. Another is that as your former minister, our relationship will change. This change in relationship is required in order for me to abide by the ethical guidelines that I covenant to follow as a UU minister. The purpose and intent of the ethical guidelines is to promote the well-being of ministers as well as the congregations and communities they serve. I trust the wisdom that is contained in these guidelines which have been developed taking into consideration ministerial transitions that have occurred in the past.

While it is not specifically written in the ethical guidelines, the common practice has been that a minister who departs/retires from a congregational ministry refrain from active engagement with the congregation, including staff, members and friends, for a year after the ministry ends. This allows the new minister, whether interim or settled, the opportunity to establish relationships that aren't hampered or tainted by the presence of the former minister. While I will be remaining in Bozeman for at least a year after I retire, I intend to follow the practice of "stepping-away" from any involvement with the Fellowship until at least mid-year 2023.

It is quite likely that after my retirement, I will see some of you in the community. I look forward to such encounters. When we meet, I will greet you warmly and be eager to engage in conversation about almost any topic or issue you would care to raise. I say almost any topic or issue because there is one subject that I will not engage in discussion about. That one area is anything having to do with UUFB. Avoiding such discussions will prevent the possibility of my saying something that could create difficulties for the new minister or for UUFB.

I want the very best for all of you and the Fellowship as a whole. I believe the best way to support the ongoing health and vitality of the Fellowship is to follow both the wisdom that has been gained from many ministers who have departed/retired from congregations and the ethical guidelines that have been created to guide ministers who are departing/retiring now. Because of my commitment to the ongoing health and vitality of UUFB, I will offer whatever support or assistance may be requested of me by the minister(s) who follow me.

In the future, you will have a new minister. Entering a new community and ministry is no simple task. I encourage all of you to be as welcoming and supportive of the minister(s) who follow me as you have been with me. Until my retirement begins on July 1, I will be here with you and for you as fully as I possibly can be.

BOARD REPORT

As we enjoy the warming of this Montana spring – still hoping for more snow to protect us from fires this summer – Board activities are heating way up. This is a busy time when the 2021–22 Board concludes its work and passes on to a new Board at the end of May.

Town Hall May 15 – We also plan a Town Hall in the building to discuss the minister transition. There's a lot of activity going on, and the Board will be making important decisions. We want the congregation to be fully informed about the issues and decisions.

Annual Meeting June 5 – We have our May Annual Meeting planned to elect Board members for the 2022–23 Program Year. This event will be held IN PERSON in the Sanctuary, for the first time in a long time. Anyone who cannot attend in person is encouraged to fill out a proxy form to allow another person to vote on your behalf. An announcement with instructions will be sent out soon.

Easing restrictions on in-person gatherings – The Board continues to assess our use of the building for services and other in-person activities as the pandemic appears to stabilize. The Covid policy we approved in 2021 provided guidance for the Board in making decisions, but we have altered several of those provisions by recent Board votes. While masks are still required, several changes have been approved:

- allow attendees to sing during the services (with masks)
- lift size limitations on meetings in the Social Hall and Sanctuary
- allow meetings of not more than 10 adults in the large classroom
- no longer ask for reservations to attend in-person services or RE
- allow the collection plate to be passed around during services

More changes are likely in the future, assuming the pandemic does not roar back.

Volunteer! - Now that we are meeting in person again and our connections are being renewed, please consider volunteering your talents to the Fellowship.

In the last two years of pandemic, UUFB has contracted. We now have lots of opportunities for service, including planning for fall retreat, social activities, fundraising events (which are also prime opportunities for socializing), stewardship, and committee work.

Even before the pandemic, our committees and teams were shorthanded; the pandemic has simply brought the issue into clearer focus. UUFB is not at all unique in this. Reports from other UUs and organizations show that volunteerism is on the decline.

There are many reasons posited for this. Perhaps it's that Americans no longer are "joiners" as our parents and grandparents were after World War II. Maybe it's our more complex lives, dealing with work and family balance and having little time left for volunteering. I've also heard that we are experiencing the effects of "late stage capitalism," where far too much is expected of working folks. I don't know what to make of any of this, but whatever the causes, UUFB feels this effect just as other groups do.

Our biggest goal right now is to reconnect with each other and strengthen our UUFB community. We want to get back the momentum we lost before the pandemic so we can keep serving our members and friends, our families, and the broader community.

There is no better way to do that than to volunteer. Committee work is an option, and there are many opportunities to contribute without a longer-term commitment. Put your feet in the water. Talk to me if you want to discuss how you might serve.

"As a faith tradition, Unitarian Universalism makes sacred the right and responsibility to engage in this free and responsible quest as an act of religious devotion. Institutionally, we have left open the questions of what truth and meaning are, acknowledging that mindful people will, in every age, discover new insights."—Rev. 5th Sunday Offering to World Central Kitchen (WCK) - May 29

The Social Justice Action Committee (SJAC) has specified that the 5/29 offering will go to World Central Kitchen (WCK). World Central Kitchen is first to the frontlines, providing meals in response to humanitarian, climate, and community crises throughout the world. Within days of the initial Russian invasion, WCK began serving meals to families traveling long distances and waiting for hours at various border crossings in Poland, Romania, Moldova, Hungary, and Slovakia. At the same time, urgent food needs quickly grew within Ukraine. For residents who remain either in their homes or the millions of people who have traveled west and are internally displaced, WCK mobilized local restaurants, expanding response to provide hot meals at train stations, shelters, hospitals, and directly to people in their homes.
