REVEREND REFLECTIONS REV. MARGO RINEHART

As a Unitarian Universalist, sometimes I find it difficult to know what to do with the December holiday season, especially Christmas Eve. My parents were atheists, my aunt and uncle are deeply religious people and Jesus is their savior. I lean toward Transcendentalism mixed with western Buddhist thought. But what I am sure of is the power of memory. I can remember the magic of Christmas past, when the tree was so tall compared to my five-year-old stature. Wrapped boxes were so exciting. My mother baked and sold dozens of fruitcakes made with high quality candied or dried fruits imported from Italy - And I helped from the time I was old enough to stir the batter. The house always smelled of cinnamon, ginger, apples, fudge or pfeffernusse baking. Currently, the December holiday season doesn't come alive until the first holiday treat is baked and the first Christian Christmas carol comes over the radio or Spotify. Then I enter into a time warp of Christmases past. All the rituals and traditions. Where to find the perfect little tree, the decorations. Memories of decorating the tree with my son (while my husband whips up Irish coffees) become entirely intermixed with all the tree decorating of my childhood. Same with all of the holiday baking and all the Christmas Eve church services with carols of old.

A fellow time traveler, Quinn Caldwell, says, "It's not nostalgia; it's not just a hazy remembrance of the time back when things used to be better than they are now." Rather Caldwell says it's a collapsing of time, a drawing in of past and future into a fully integrated now. It is my childhood understanding and wonder at a magical story that comes in the present due to the collapsing of time. It is what allows me to listen to the songs of elementary school students and hear angels and to long so deeply for miracles, such when homeless people make it through the harsh winter. It is also what allows me to see every family as holy and the birth of every child as saving. The long, dark winter nights gift me time for wondering and seeking.

Whatever your December traditions – solstice, the anniversary of the Enlightenment of Buddha, Hannukah, or just a good book and blanket on a cold winter's night, may you experience awe and wonder at the magnificence that we are under the shinning darkness of millions of stars, together.

What? The Unitarian Universalist Association is considering a change to our Seven Principles?

It's true, the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) is encouraging us to consider a change. A change that potentially comes about through the recommendation of the Article II Study Commission and delegate votes at General Assembly in 2023 and possibly 2024.

Article II of the UU Bylaws holds our Seven Principles and Six Sources. It is the foundation for all of the work of the UUA and its member congregations and covenantal communities. As we are congregations without creeds and an association of churches, rather than a denomination, our covenants are the promises we make to one another. Our current Seven Principles began with the language "We member congregations of the UUA covenant to affirm and promote..." and then goes on to list the Principles. Note that we are responsible to one another and the use of the active language of "affirm and promote." We make promises about not only our attitudes but also our actions. Article of our Bylaws is the covenant to which all of our congregations pledge themselves when they become members of the UUA.

Our current Principles and Purpose was revised in 1987. The bylaws are to be reviewed no less than every 15 years. Since General Assembly (GA) in 2017, our association has been discussing an Eighth Principle addressing racism, an amendment to the First Principle that would include non-human life, and the Seventh Principle being expanded. Task forces, the Commission on Appraisal, and grass roots groups have been asking for changes. In response the Board of the UUA created the Article II Study Commission to consider possible amendments to Article II. The Study Commission convened in the fall of 2020. They held feedback sessions and distributed surveys throughout 2021 and into the spring of 2022. They considered responses received and continue with redrafts, including after GA in June of 2022. The vote for the proposed changes occurs as a potential two-part process. Delegates at GA of 2023 will vote on whether the changes should be placed on the 2024 ballot. Only a simple majority is needed for the proposed changes to be placed on the 2024 ballot. If a majority exists, the changes will stand for vote at GA 2024 – where a ¾ majority is required for passing the changes to the Article II Purposes and Covenant.

As for our own work in this process, we need to be better informed and send delegates, virtually or in person, to GA in June of 2023. Rev. Margo's January 22nd sermon will be about the changes to Article II, and I will offer an educational workshop on three different dates in late January and early February. In the interim, do spend time on the Article II website at http://uua.org/a2sc.

The website contains all of the new language. Note the explicit statement that love is the enduring force that holds us together: "We draw from our heritages of freedom and reason, hope and courage, building on the foundation of love. Love inspires and powers the passion with which we embody our values. Inseparable from one another, these shared values are:

- **Justice**. We work to be diverse multicultural Beloved Communities where all people thrive. We covenant to dismantle racism and all form of oppression within individuals and our institutions. We are accountable to each other for this work.
- **Generosity**. We cultivate a spirit of gratitude and hope. We covenant to freely share our faith, presence, and resources. Compassionate generosity connects us one to another in relationships of mutuality.
- **Evolution**. We adapt to the changing world. We covenant to collectively transform and grow spiritually and ethically. Evolution is fundamental to life and to our UU heritages, never complete and never perfect.
- **Pluralism**. We celebrate that we are all sacred beings diverse in culture, theology, and experience. We covenant to learn from one another and openly explore the depth and breadth of our many wisdoms. We embrace our differences and commonalities with love, curiosity, and respect.
- **Equity**. We declare that every person has the right to flourish with dignity and worthiness. We covenant to use our time, wisdom, attention, and money to build and sustain a fully inclusive and accessible community of communities.
- **Interdependence**. We honor the sacred interdependent web of all existence. With humility we understand our place in the web. We covenant to care for and respect the earth and all beings by fostering relationships of mutuality. We work to repair th bonds we have broken.

Let's study and discuss together so that we can make decisions about whether to vote for these changes, that are first informed by love.

TRANSITIONTALK

Introduction to the Transition Team

Please allow us to introduce ourselves. We are the Transition Team, appointed by the Board to focus on the actual process of transition as we prepare to search for a new settled minister to join us in August, 2024. That search process will begin after the first of the year. In the meantime, the Transition Team will work with the minister and involve the congregation in identifying work to be done to keep us moving ahead.

Why do we need a separate Transition Team? We already have a lot of committees! Well, yes, but those committees already have purposes and agendas. And the members of those other groups, including the Board, are following their interests and their skills. Those groups were not assembled in an effort to represent a balance of interest groups, ages, genders, and length of participation in the Fellowship as the Transition Team is. Also it is common to suspend the Committee on Ministry during an Interim Minister's term, so the Transition Team fulfills some of that purpose of keeping an eye on our collective ministry and the health of the congregation.

Your Transition Team will meet monthly (more or less, as needed), and we've already met three times. We have adopted a Covenant for how we will work together as well as this mission statement:

The mission of the UUFB Transition Team is to assist the Interim Minister and the congregation as they assess the need for changes before the arrival of the next called minister. They work with the Interim Minister, communicate and bear witness to transition as the work of the congregation, and are available to hear concerns of members of the Fellowship.

The work of transition is not done only by the Transition Team. All of you in UUFB will be called on from time to time to provide information and ideas. One tool we are using as we enter this time of transition is the QACC Box, introduced by the Committee on Ministry several years ago. QACC stands for Questions, Appreciation, Comments, or Concerns (QACCs). The Transition Team welcomes it all! The QACC box, with a slot in the lid and a yellow rubber ducky on top, is stationed somewhere in the Social Hall. There is also an online QACC form at uufbozeman.org/qacc. We will review submissions at our monthly meetings. Don't forget to submit Questions AND Appreciations AND Comments, in addition to any Concerns.

The Transition Team will use a rotating chair and recorder as we convene, with Dave Rockafellow serving as our primary point of contact. We'll keep you posted monthly, and we do want to hear from you!


