# REVEREND REFLECTIONS REV. MARGO RINEHART

A Litany of Wholeheartedness by Dawn Skjei Cooley
"Because there have been times when shame has crushed our ability to be wholehearted.

We let go of who we ought to be and embrace who we are.

Because we have not always had the courage to be imperfect.

A few weeks ago, the ophthalmologist told me I needed cataract surgery. Once getting past the initial response that I'm too young to have cataracts, it meant getting down to the real issue: this makes me feel so vulnerable. In the exact same week, minister angst of "what can I preach on this month's theme of vulnerability," came to roost. Having preached on courage last fall, vulnerability had already been mentioned, as they are the opposite sides of the same coin. Probably most of you didn't want to hear that message again, I mused. But wrestling with feelings about the upcoming eye surgeries and needing to reschedule my trip home, vulnerability was knocking (actually pounding) at my door, as was the realization that vulnerability is a lesson we need to hear over and over again because we are really bad at it. As a society there is a strong message that we should be independent, steely, and capable of taking care of all of our own needs. But that message separates us from one another and denies the beauty and intricacy of the interconnected web.

I'm alone in Bozeman, no long-term friends or family here. My friend who had hoped to fly here for a week had to postpone. It was time to surrender my pseudo independence and ask for some help. First, to ask people from UUFB who recently had this surgery – what should I expect? Who is a good surgeon? Secondly, securing a bit of soup, as soup is a balm for most things. Third, is the practicality of transportation to and from two surgeries and two follow-up appointments.[1] Lastly, the most difficult thing is to inform all of you that I'm not invincible and therefore can't be available March 1st, 7th and 8th, because I need rest.

The situation of needing help is universal. Part of embracing our human vulnerability is to accept help from others, which, in turn, strengthens the interdependent web. In our quest to be independent we should not be so quick to dismiss offers of help. It is better to lean into our vulnerability and into grace. When we allow others to provide kindness and care, both giver and receiver benefit. There is a lovely children's book titled *The Boy, the Mole, the Dog & the Horse*. The boy asks the horse what was the most difficult thing the horse had ever done. The large, strong, majestic horse answers, "Asking for help." Our UUFB Covenant states that we will care for one another. This month spend extra time listening for opportunities for offering and receiving love and support.



# BOARD REPORT

The Board met on February 13, in person and via Zoom for some members.

**Search for Settled Minister** – Thanks to all who submitted names of members to be considered for the Settled Minister Search Committee. We received over 45 different names! The Board is now in the process of forming a well-balanced group of skills to help recruit our next minister. The Board's goal is to have a recommended committee in place for congregation approval by the May annual meeting.

**Transition Team** -The Board will be meeting with the Transition Team (TT) to review the UUA's Interim Progress Appraisal prepared by the TT as well as Rev. Margo. The Board approved renewing Rev. Margo's contract as our Interim Minister for another year as we search for a settled minister.

Masking Changes – Board President, Neil S. announced on Sunday morning that we are in the process of considering changing the masking requirement while attending UUFB Sunday services. Your opinion and concern are important in making this decision, so please contact Neil with your thoughts. Obviously, changes in the infection rate of Covid in the Gallatin Valley will affect our protocol as we move forward. You may also drop your comments in the QACC box located in the Fellowship Hall.

**General Assembly (GA)** – is the annual meeting of our Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA). This year the meeting is in Pittsburgh PA, June 21 – 25, 2023, both in person and online. This year it was decided to designate the 5th Sunday offering in April to financially support a member(s) who would like to attend. There are various levels of participation (and cost); see <a href="mailto:uua.org/ga/registration">uua.org/ga/registration</a> for more information.

**Renting the Building** – As another step toward post–Covid recovery, we are considering, once again, renting the building for groups outside the congregation. Rental rates for similar facilities are being explored to determine if we want to raise our rates if, and when, we open to renting.

**Support our Fellowship** - Thanks to all who pledged (or will pledge) to our Stewardship campaign! We are truly a very generous group of people. Remember also to check the bulletin board for opportunities on how you can support the on-going, continuing, forever, unceasing, unremitting, non-stop need for volunteers. # TRANSITIONTALK

In the past month, UUFB's Transition Team has been focused on the part of our work that makes regular appraisals of our interim ministry. That's our ministry, not the minister. These appraisals happen at regular intervals, the first of which is six months into the transition ministry, which was February. These appraisals address ministry from the perspectives of both the minister and the congregation, which also has a share in our overall ministry (or think of it as our mission). They help us clarify our preparation for settled ministry. As the appraisal process is set up by the UUA, Rev. Margo completes a version of the questionnaire, and the Transition Team answers the same questions in a separate document. The Board has reviewed both documents and both have been turned in to the UUA Transitions Office.

Now that the six-month appraisal milestone has been reached, we will be returning to another major project: identifying areas where UUFB needs to focus attention in preparing for our next settled minister. We are using a framework laid out in "The Interim Minister as Systems Analyst" by Richard A. Nugent of the UUA staff. Nugent identifies a dozen "systems" that make up any religious community—things like membership, caring, religious education, finances, etc. Our process may feel backwards: we first set aside those components where we feel the Fellowship is stable and working well. In our case, a few of these are Staffing, Finances, Physical Plant and Worship, among others, that don't seem to need special attention.

The next step was to prioritize several of the others as we identified three core areas to focus our work in the next 18 months. In alphabetical order, they are

- Connection and Engagement
- Governance and Leadership
- Religious Education and Theological/Spiritual Grounding

In the next few weeks, we will be fleshing out the definitions of these areas; we will share those fuller descriptions soon.

During this interim time, the Transition Team also functions as the Committee on Ministry (COM). One function of the COM is to "perceive concerns brought to or recognized by the committee, reflect on those concerns, and develop proposals to the relevant bodies who may best address them." The Transition Team is doing this work in a couple different ways. For one thing, we have begun having a table in the Social Hall after services on the first Sunday of every month, with the next one coming on March 5. We hope you will take this chance to visit with us, to share your perceptions, and to find out more about UUFB's Transition work. The other way we hear from you is through the QACC Box. (QACC stands for Questions, Appreciation, Comments, or Concerns.) The QACC box with a slot to insert cards and a yellow rubber ducky on top. It's usually in the Social Hall, near the windows, or on the credenza beneath the photos of past ministers. There is also an online QACC form at <a href="https://www.uufbozeman.org/qacc">uufbozeman.org/qacc</a>. We review all submissions at our meetings. Please remember that we want Questions AND Appreciations AND Comments, in addition to any Concerns.

We do want to hear from you! Comments at our table on March 5 and questions and notes in the QACC box have already proven valuable. Do stay in touch.




# 4th Sunday Glass Recycling

# In Loving Memory of John Berg



John Berg was born January 30, 1947 in Bozeman, Montana and died on February 17, 2023. He grew up playing backyard baseball with the neighborhood kids with his dad Lloyd as the pitcher. After a day of roaming the neighborhood, he was summoned home by his mother Edna playing the bugle. John graduated from Bozeman Senior High in 1965. While there, he enjoyed his time playing trombone in the band, wrestling, and playing on the football team. He went on to attend Montana State and graduated with a degree in Chemical Engineering. Shortly after graduation, he reconnected with his classmate Carolyn Boyd. They were married in 1971 and together for the next 51 years.

After a couple of stops, they settled in Laurel for the next 37 years. While there, John worked at Cenex and made many good friends. He and Carolyn had two children, Sam and Libby. He was a great dad, supporting his kids in any way he could – from making a maze big enough to hold a horse for a science fair project, to driving all over the state to watch his kids' activities. While at home, John was always doing some sort of project: from fixing fences, caring for farm animals, plumbing the sink, and moving irrigation pipes. He liked to be busy. It was in Laurel that he developed a lifelong passion for chain sawing. He rarely saw a tree that couldn't be improved by removing just a "few" branches.

After retiring from Cenex, John and Carolyn moved back to Bozeman into the same house he grew up in, where he continued to make good friends at Unitarians and around town, while also reconnecting with high school classmates. It was in Bozeman that he thrived as a grandpa. Papa John would read books, pitch wiffle balls for hours, have tea in a little cup, go sledding, or do whatever else his grandkids wanted.

One of the things that was a constant in John's life was his love of the outdoors and excitement for new things. It started as a kid with family trips to Yellowstone Park and continued for the rest of his life. He was always up for an adventure, happy to be riding his bike, canoeing down a river, or climbing a peak. John was always excited to take someone new along, or to try something new. From spending the night on a ledge climbing Granite Peak, to heading home in the rain, insisting that the end was just around the next bend, his optimism and cheer always made everything better (especially when the end wasn't just around the next bend).

One constant throughout John's life was his jolly attitude which continued even through his final years with dementia. He made most situations better just by being there and being happy. He was a good and loyal friend who touched many lives. He had a way of seeing the best in everyone.

John was preceded in death by his parents and brother Charlie. He is survived by his sisters Sally Daer and Annie Clcale, his wife Carolyn Boyd, his children Sam Berg and Libby Berg Wieczorek, and his grandchildren Riley, Max, Oscar, Alex, and Ivan. In lieu of flowers, please make donations to The Bozeman Unitarian Universalist Fellowship, Yellowstone National Park, or go spend a little time outside and think of John.
