October 1, 2023 • "Creation Centered Spirituality: Inspiration from Hildegard of Bingen" • Rev. Margo Rinehart Come and hear how twelfth-century Abbess, Hildegard of Bingen's messages of environmental care and natural healing are still speaking to us today.

October 8, 2023 • "Returning to Our Ancestral Roots" • Nia To Go There, Ph.D.

Returning to our ancestral roots is necessary to heal our suffering-wholeness. As a storyteller, Nia will describe her first Sun Dance experience. She will elaborate on the wisdom she gleaned from the Sun Dance created by her Indigenous ancestors as a way of validating the importance of reciprocal relationships along with a profound sense of interconnectedness with our animate planet and other life-forms.

In acknowledgment of her name "To Go There" (Ketoteyin), Nia is a sojourner, intent on making visible the web of relations within which we live. Nia grew up on Turtle Mountain Reservation in North Dakota. Her tribal ancestry is Cree. She has dedicated the past 30 years to rediscovering the ancient teachings and cultural practices of her Indigenous ancestors.

October 15, 2023 • "Stewardship: A Heritage of Unitarian Universalist Generosity" • Rev. Margo Rinehart Come and follow the historical trail of UU's who lived lives of service and consider how we can be good stewards in our fellowship and in our larger community.

October 22, 2023 • "The Search for Truth and Meaning in an Art Museum" • Christina Barbachano

Art Museums and UU churches have a lot in common. Art Museums are places where one might find things that lead them to finding truth and meaning in their lives, or be able to see the worth and dignity of a subject matter that they may not have been able to see or be inspired to care for our earth and home in a new way or engage them in advocacy towards a free and just world for all. One may hear music and read texts that challenge their thinking. They may even weep at an artwork that connects to them in ways they never considered. The UU principles can be explored in many ways, why not an art museum?

Christina Barbachano is an artist, educator, and now the Executive Director of the Holter Museum of Art in Helena, MT. She is a almost a life-long UU and also searches for truth and meaning in her own studio practice. She lives in Helena, MT in a household of highly creative humans who challenge her thinking and help her learn new things about herself and this beautiful world every day.

October 29, 2023 • "Day of the Dead: A Celebration of Our Ancestors" • Rev. Margo Rinehart

REVEREND REFLECTIONS REV. MARGO RINEHART



When speaking about forgiveness this past Sunday, I used a reading from the Reverend Victoria Safford, wherein she describes part of what she has learned from Yom Kippur. In the Jewish tradition in their observance of Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement and the Days of Awe are about repentance and forgiveness. Safford describes what should be the condition of our hearts when we are considering asking to be forgiven.

The task is not to patch things up, smooth things over, reach a compromise, or sweep mistakes and uneasy memories under the rug; the task is not to feel better. The task is ownership. The goal is truth, for its own redemptive sake. I did this. I said this to you, and it was wrong. I botched this. I betrayed you thusly. I demeaned you, whether you ever knew it or not. This is the truth in which both of us are living and I ask you to forgive me... The task is not about comfort, it is about truth, about wholeness and holiness.

In illustrating the essential, gritty, and extremely difficult work of forgiveness and repair, I leaned into our UUA Common Read. Each year, the Unitarian Universalist Association chooses a book to be read in all our congregations. This is a chance for UUs all over the globe to read the same book and bring our individual perspectives into a collective experience. This year the book is On Repentance and Repair: Making Amends in an Unapologetic World by Rabbi Danya Ruttenberg. Rabbi Ruttenberg serves as scholar in residence at the National Council of Jewish Women. Her book uses the work of medieval Jewish philosopher Maimonides to engage us in thinking about reparation. In our current culture, we do not tolerate discomfort well and therefore, try to sweep unpleasant occurrences away and participate in superficial and insincere gestures of 'sorry' or 'get over it'. This lets the offending party off the hook and does little or nothing to validate and support the person who has been harmed. Rabbi Ruttenberg introduces the idea that forgiveness is much less important than the repair work to which the offending party is obligated. She informs us that the word that is traditionally translated as 'repentance' really means 'return' and that returning is a restoration to the person harmed and perhaps to the entire community. Her focus is not on whether forgiveness is granted but on whether the person who has done harm engages deeply in the steps of repentance and repair. The methods are applied to interpersonal relationships, random violence, abuse, Native American land rights, and our country's legacy of slavery and much more. She guides of through the five steps for repair described by Maimonides:

- Naming and owning the harm.
- Committing to change and engaging in deep transformational work.
- Making restitution and accepting consequences.
- Sincere apology that upholds the wronged party and with no expectation of forgiveness.
- Making different choices and engaging in new behavior based upon new attitudes.

In my own life, holiday planning has already begun. I will travel home at Thanksgiving and Christmas to see friends, family, and acquaintances. This book has been a source of deep thought and healing for me as I consider some of those relationships. It also helped in considering self-forgiveness. There is not a single person in our community who would not benefit from experiencing part or of all of Ruttenberg's message of hope. It was selected by the UUA to be experienced in community. Therefore, can we gather to support one another while we explore repentance, repair, and forgiveness? If anyone is willing to lead a 1-4 session book group in January or beyond, please let me know, and I will get you started. The book can also be borrowed from me upon request. In the words of Rabbi Hama Bar Hanina, "Great is repentance, for it brings healing to the world."

BOARD REPORT

As the weather cools, Board activities are heating up. The Board met for our regular monthly meeting Tuesday, September 12 and held our annual retreat the following Saturday, September 16.

Board Members

Regular Business

Our Whole Lives - The Board agreed that Jeanne should sign a Memorandum of Understanding with Bridgercare to partner with our OWL sexuality education program. Bridgercare obtained a grant to deliver sexuality education, and this partnership is expected to be of great help promoting and delivering the program.

Financial – Ensuring the financial health of UUFB is a fundamental responsibility of the Board of Directors. Bruce DePriester presented our quarterly financial report, noting that we are on solid ground.

The Board agreed to reinvest a portion of our working funds into short-term CDs.

We also discussed membership and attendance in the context of our financials, recognizing that our financial health depends on continuing to attract people to join the UUFB community. We lost a number of members during the pandemic years, both through relocation and death, and are reassured to know that new folks continue to join.

The Board was pleased to learn that several folks have volunteered for the Stewardship committee and are ready to develop and lead our annual Pledge Drive. (Our thanks to the Transition Team for the Service Is Our Prayer initiative!) Activity is planned for mid-October, so the Board was charged with determining a 2024 budget and pledge goal.

We considered adding funding for a choir or musical director to the budget. This addition to staff was researched and approved in previous years, but was delayed by the pandemic.

Negotiating Team - The Settled Minister Search Committee asked that a Board member be chosen to serve on the Negotiating Team. Bruce DePriester volunteered and was approved as the Board representative of this three-person team.

Board Retreat

Culture - We discussed the UUFB culture of long meetings and off-topic discussions which may discourage people from volunteering to serve on the Board or committees. The Board agreed that we will take steps to curtail such distractions and make our Board meetings shorter and more effective.

Organization – We agreed that the UUFB committee structure needs clarification. What is a committee vs a "Task Force" or "Team"? Jeanne worked with Board members to draft an organizational chart.

We agreed that the Program Council shall be renamed Leadership Council to more accurately reflect its desired function.

Committee charges – All committees should have Charges describing their scope. Charges, charters, or descriptions for committees are scattered in various places, and we were unable to find charges for several committees. We considered the charges/charters/descriptions currently available and discussed how they might be clarified or improved.

It was also noted that there are general charges applicable to all committees, such as developing a budget, reviewing expenditures, and writing and maintaining related policies. Neil will write a general charge applicable to all committees.

Policies and other documents - We need a general definition of "policy" and other document types. Policies are approved by the Board and state general objectives and requirements. Committees must have flexibility to conduct their business within the boundaries of their charges and relevant policies.

Liaisons - Board members volunteered to act as liaisons to each committee; see the chart below. Elizabeth will develop a definition of the role of liaison. In the next few weeks Liaisons will contact their assigned committees and discuss the liaison role, committee charge, committee description (if applicable), and specific committee activities.

- 3. What are the important qualities and characteristics you would like to see in our new minister? Why?



The "Service Is Our Prayer" project brought a couple dozen people to sign up for 50 different volunteer roles. Thank you ALL! This brings stability and energy to the life of our Fellowship community. The link to sign up is still on our website, under Members/Friends (<u>uufbozeman.org/service-is-our-prayer</u>) so you can still use the sign up to find ways for you to fit in, but we are scaling back our promotion of it for a while. One bit of comment we have heard is that people really appreciated the "Service Is Our Prayer" moments during Sunday services. So an extra thank-you goes to those who shared their own motivations and experiences.

This month the Board and the Transition Team have been completing the 12-month evaluation of interim ministry (not the minister) requested by the UUA Transitions Team. We hope to submit that document by the end of September. (Rev. Margo's first year ended on July 31, 2023.) We have also provided information to the Ministerial Search Committee as they respond to questions in the Congregational Record.

Our next project will be to follow up on all the input gathered from those who attended the May 7 "Workshop to Shape the Future." A number of the items brought up in those break-out sessions have already been addressed, we think, so we will be looking for what to report and what to attend to in the next several months.

During the Interim time, the Transition Team also functions as the Committee on Ministry (COM), charged to "perceive concerns brought to or recognized by the committee. The main way we hear from you is through the QACC Box. (QACC stands for Questions, Appreciation, Comments, or Concerns.) The wooden QACC box has a slot to insert cards and a yellow rubber ducky on top. It's usually in the Social Hall near the windows or on the credenza outside Rev. Margo's office. There is also an online QACC form at uufbozeman.org/qacc. We review all submissions at our meetings. Please remember that we want Questions AND Appreciations AND Comments, in addition to any Concerns.



Chalice Circles


Sign Up Now!
