Not surprisingly, she loves to write poetry, midrashim, and prayers. Her work has been published in ERGON, Liturgy, Worship, the CCAR Journal, Ritual Well, and a number of anthologies. She lives with her husband and children in Bozeman, MT.

Has Spring already come to Bozeman?

The title above is not a comment about our above 32-degrees weather of late, rather this is a reminder that in Celtic tradition February 1st is the first day of spring. It is the day between the winter solstice and the spring equinox. It is also the chosen day for the feast day for Saint Brigid. Brigid of Kildare (ca. 451-523) was an abbess, a celebrant at Catholic Mass during a century when women were allowed to lead Mass, and a strong believer in Celtic spiritual traditions and wisdom. Legend says her father was a Druid and her mother a Christian.

In his book Sacred Earth, Sacred Soul: Celtic Wisdom for Reawakening to What Our Souls Know, author John Philip Newell informs us that the spirit of Brigid continues to reside in the liminal space between opposite dimensions of different forms of life. She stands in the doorway between the pre-Christian and the Christian, the portal between the divine and the human, the relationship between humanity and the earth, and the liminal space between the womb of the universe and what is trying to come into being.

The stories around Brigid describe a woman who practiced and taught Celtic wisdom and incorporated consistent parts of Christianity. This broadened her spiritual practices rather than limiting them. She believed in the deep knowledge of the ancient oaks, the sacredness within all living things, and our connection to and responsibility for the earth. Eventually, she was known as the midwife and caretaker of Jesus and called Mary of the Gaels. While Empire was busy exploiting land, animals, and people, Brigid was taking care of the poor and the refugees as well as celebration and tending of the Light embodied in all living things and the earth itself.


While I don't expect that most of us will convert to Druidic worship, many of us engage unknowingly in some types of Druidic like practices. Like Brigid of Kildare, as Unitarian Universalists, we look at how different kinds of spiritual and humanist thought can enhance what we've always known. That masculine and feminine must exist in balance and nurture one another, that the earth is sacred, and we must carry the light.

After her death, Brigid was remembered for centuries in a pre-Christian ritual of the Continuous Fire. The celebration of the Light in all things that could not be overcome by darkness. The centuries old Perpetual Fire was violently extinguished by 16th century Protestant Reformers. But those who knew the wisdom began keeping a Perpetual Fire in the family hearth. While spring comes to Bozeman later than in many places, we can still keep the fire in our hearts burning and look toward the sun to illuminate our commitments to wisdom, earth care, kindness, and peace.

Quote from John Philip Newell: "In the Celtic tradition it was said that we have forgotten who we are and have fallen out of relationship with the earth and with one another. Thus, the path to well-being is not about ...acquiring spiritual knowledge that is essentially foreign to us. It is about waking up to a knowledge that is deep in the fabric of our being and living in relationship to this wisdom.

## **BOARD REPORT**

**Annual Meeting** - We had good attendance at the Annual Meeting held on January 21, with 68 members attending in-person or by proxy. Members voted to approve the proposed 2024 budget and to accept the plan to renew our Welcoming Congregation status in the UUA. Jeanne Moe, President of the Board of Directors, chaired the meeting with Elizabeth Rose, Past President, acting as Parliamentarian.

**2024 Budget** – We continue to celebrate the results of our stewardship drive, in which pledges actually exceeded the goal. With this strong show of commitment from members and friends, the Board proposed a budget to meet the growing needs of the Fellowship.

Jeanne presented budget details and responded to questions. There was a request from the floor to see the actual financial results from 2023. This data will be available to anyone who requests it. A concern was raised that the proposed budget contained no entry for the Minister's Sabbatical Fund. The rules of the meeting did not allow changes to the budget from the floor, but Jeanne assured folks that this would be examined by the Board.

**Welcoming Congregation Renewal** – Jeanne asked Lisa Baker to assist in describing the renewal process. She noted that the current UUA process was simplified from a previous version considered a few years ago and is quite achievable. Indeed, she noted that UUFB is already doing most of what is required.

**Announcements** - After votes were completed, announcements were made concerning the new Midweek Refuge and the Communications survey, as well as safety training open to members and friends. Details on these are available through emails sent through the listserve.

Thanks to everyone who attended and contributed to the mission and vision of the Fellowship.

**January Board Meeting** - In the first Board meeting of 2024, we addressed issues to be voted on at the UUFB January 21 Annual Meeting, see above. We also discussed a proposal from the Safety Committee to add protective film over windows in our building to impede violent attacks. We will discuss this further in our February meeting.

Decisions made in this meeting include:

• Approved offering our building for meetings twice a month by Bienvenidos.

# TRANSITION ALK

The main initiative we've been working on this last month is the Midweek Refuge, an opportunity for anyone in the larger community to sit silently in our sanctuary to rest, remember, mourn, pray, meditate, embrace your blessings, feel gratitude—whatever a quiet place can provide. Our building will be open from noon to 2:00 p.m. every Wednesday, for UUFB members and friends and anyone in the community. One of the best ways to "advertise" this opportunity is word of mouth, so we invite everyone to invite others.

The Transition Team regularly talks about how we integrate newcomers into our UUFB community. To the extent that this welcoming is part of our ministry, it is also a concern of the Transition Team. The Membership/Hospitality Committee leads these efforts, but this work involves all of us. That committee, by the way, is looking for additional members, so speak to your Sunday morning greeter to find out how you can help us welcome newcomers.

We're looking ahead to a smooth ending to Rev. Margo's time with us and then to the transition to a new settled minister. In addition to completing UUA processes for assessing both the minister and our shared ministry during this interim, we are thinking forward to how things might work with our new settled minister. The current Transition Team is working on a plan for transition to the next Committee on Ministry and how communication will flow to Rev. X as they join our community.

While we don't have results of our quick Communications Poll in time for the newsletter deadline, we'll take this chance to thank those who have responded.

**Talk to us!** During this Interim time, the Transition Team also functions as the Committee on Ministry, charged to "perceive concerns" that may arise and keep an eye on our shared ministry. If you want to talk with us on a Sunday, you will find us by our green name tags, so do look us up during coffee hour. The main way we hope to hear from you is through the QACC Box. (QACC stands for Questions, Appreciation, Comments, or Concerns.) The wooden QACC box has a slot to insert cards and a yellow rubber ducky on top. It's usually in the Social Hall near the windows or on the credenza outside Rev. Margo's office (There is also an online QACC form at <u>uufbozeman.org/qacc</u>). We review all submissions at our meetings. If you put your name on your QACC, there can be follow-up, which there is not for anonymous items. Please remember that we want Questions AND Appreciations AND Comments, in addition to any Concerns.

I love getting the Family Promise update each Friday. There is almost always a story about a family that was saved from homelessness. A few weeks ago it was a mother and baby who were sleeping in their car on belowzero nights and this week it is a family that was about to lose their home because of changes in their jobs. They were helped by Family Promise's Prevention and Diversion Specialist and will be able to stay in their home and have a safe place for themselves and their soon-to-be-born baby.

If you would like to get the weekly update go to the Family Promise website - familypromisegy.org and sign up at the "Join the Family" link.

Current needs for families are laundry detergent and dryer sheets, diapers and pull-ups (size 3-6), multipurpose cleaning spray, toilet paper, hand soap, and dishwasher pods. All of these items can be put in the blue Family Promise tub in the social hall. Rachel Rockafellow will get them to Family Promise. Thank you, Rachel.

In my mind, the solutions to homelessness are political and economic but while those areas become more committed to safe housing for all, I feel good about what we are doing for individual families. They are being helped to have homes for their families. 80% of families served by Family Promise continue to have stable housing after 12 months.


