November 2, 2025 • "Living the Examen" with Rev. Joseph Carver

"Living the Examen" means practicing a daily prayer of reflection, developed by the Jesuit mystic and Saint Ignatius of Loyola, to help one notice God's presence and discern God's will in our lives. It involves reviewing the day with gratitude, paying attention to your emotions, and looking forward to the next day with a renewed sense of purpose. The practice can be as simple as a some time of reflection to notice the sacred in the everyday events. The purpose is of practicing the Examen is to sensitize our hearts and attune our spirit to the language God uses for us as individuals, as God's beloved one. It is learning the love language that God uses just for us.

Rev. Joseph Carver is a Board Certified Interfaith Chaplain and Director of Spiritual Health at Bozeman Health. Raised on a farm in rural New York, his deep connection with creation shapes his ministry. Ordained for over 25 years, he draws inspiration from poets Jane Kenyon and Mary Oliver and the Jesuit mystic Teilhard de Chardin. He holds degrees from Oxford University and the Jesuit School of Theology in Berkeley, and has taught philosophy and ethics at several universities. With 15 years of chaplaincy experience, Joseph embraces embodied spirituality as a way to encounter the sacred in creation.

Megkian Doyle is Executive Director of Mountain Shadow Association, a Native-led nonprofit serving the Crow Reservation. Formerly a teacher, MSU professor, and Director of the Regional Community Action Team at One Health, she also led the Raising Places initiative in Lodge Grass. That work inspired the creation of Mountain Shadow, several community projects, and plans for a family healing center. Megkian lives in Bozeman with her husband and five children, all members of the Crow Tribe.

BOARD REPORT

It was a comparatively calm October for the UUFB board. At the October meeting, we voted in favor of allocating additional funds to some necessary maintenance for the building and grounds. Sadly, this will include the removal of some diseased and dying trees outside of the fellowship. The plan is for this tree removal to occur in November.

In addition, we hosted the Ministerial Search Committee town hall. This occurred on Oct 26th after the service. There was a great turnout. The town hall began with Co-President Kaylin G. providing remarks. Next, members and friends provided their thoughtful comments about whether we should open our ministerial search to non-UU ministers. The comments were largely in favor of considering this option. After the meeting, we shared a summary of the comments as well as the spoken remarks to the fellowship via the email list serve.

The board also hired a new Religious Exploration Co-Teacher (Sheldon) to work with our Coordinator of Religious Exploration (Asherah). For an introduction to Sheldon, see the religious exploration column in this newsletter!

So what's next? The board is taking steps to strengthen key committees that guide the work of the fellowship.

TOWN HALL ON MINISTER SEARCH

On October 26, 2025, UUFB held a town hall to discuss the ongoing ministerial search. Board co-president and search committee member Kaylin G. opened with background on the search process and recent challenges. Kaylin explained the difference between settled ministers, who are called by a vote of the congregation for an indefinite term, and contract ministers, who are hired by the board for a fixed period, typically two to three years (sometimes with an "option to call" as a settled minister).

Over the past two years, UUFB has searched unsuccessfully for a new minister. The 2023-2024 settled minister search drew two applicants; the committee pursued one candidate enthusiastically, but that person accepted a position at their home congregation. The 2024-2025 contract-to-call search, offering a full-time position with salary of \$71,000 and total compensation of \$115,000, received no applicants. Earlier searches, including in 2015-2016, also had limited interest. Nationwide, only seven of thirteen UU congregations in settled searches found matches last year. Some ministers left parish ministry after COVID and ministers are increasingly limiting their job search to specific geographic areas due to family or personal reasons.

Given these realities, the UUFB board is considering broadening the ministerial search to include ministers from other liberal denominations, such as the United Church of Christ. This could expand the candidate pool while maintaining a focus on shared values. However, non-UU ministers are not vetted by the UUA, meaning the fellowship would need to conduct its own background and reference checks. UUFB could continue in the UU search process while exploring this broader option.

During the town hall, many members supported opening the search, citing positive experiences with non-UU ministers and visiting clergy. Others urged care in preserving UUFB's distinct liberal religious, humanist identity.

The board will take into consideration the feedback at the town hall and consider authorizing the search committee to seek non-UU ministerial applicants.

At UUFB, everything we do—every service, gathering, and act of care—happens through the shared efforts of our members and friends. Our volunteers make the Fellowship come alive, serving on committees that plan worship, care for our building and grounds, guide our social justice work, introduce our children to Unitarian Universalism, and create opportunities for learning, connection, and joy. Over the next few months, the Pathways to Participation program will help us all learn more about these vital committees and the many ways they sustain our shared ministry.

On selected Sundays over the next several months, our committees will take turns being featured. You'll hear a brief announcement during the service and have the chance to chat with committee members during coffee hour. Some will have tables with handouts or displays; others may offer a special snack or activity. It's a fun and easy way to discover how our Fellowship works behind the scenes—and to find your own next step in getting involved.

When you stop by a table, ask questions, or sign up to help, you're not just volunteering—you're deepening your connection to the community we create together every day. UUFB thrives because of the care, creativity, and commitment of people like you.





Growing Together: Why UUFB Membership Matters

“If you have ever considered membership in UUFB, now is the time to do it” is a quote from Rev. Margo. We were discussing our unsuccessful minister search, and she was saying that her observation is that a Fellowship’s size is one thing that candidates consider very carefully. Larger congregations may be more financially stable, an important consideration for ministerial candidates.

Our membership peaked in 2020 with 144 members. By 2023 it had fallen to 116 members, and in 2024 it was 110. and then of course Covid which affected membership in all types of organizations. As we again search for a minister, we are encouraged that our membership is now 124 and when we welcome new members in December, we anticipate having a few more.

Our bylaws state that “Active members are those who have both participated in the Fellowship and made a financial contribution within the preceding twelve months”. Participation can be as simple as attending services and a financial contribution can be money that is put in the offering on a Sunday. We also encourage potential members to attend one of the orientation sessions or a newcomers’ breakfast to learn more about UU and UUFB. Attendance isn’t mandatory. We just want you to know that UU and UUFB are right for you. If you decide to join you confirm your commitment by signing the Membership Book. Signing is a significant act and will be acknowledged by the congregation in a welcoming ceremony.

In years past, UUFB made a yearly contribution to UUA based on the number of members in the congregation. Some chose not to join for fear of causing financial issues for UUFB. UUA now figures our financial contribution as a percentage of our budget, so that is no longer an issue.

If you think this might be the time when membership feels right for you, we invite you to talk to a member of the Hospitality Membership Committee (the people wearing “Ask me About UUFB” buttons every Sunday or contact our chair Tonya S. (contact our Office Admin for her email).

All of who you are is sacred. All of who you are is welcome.

Building Trans-Welcoming Congregations: Session 3 - November 16



5th Offering to the Western Alaska Disaster Relief 2025 Fund - November 30

The Western Alaska Disaster Relief 2025 Fund, established by local community organizations and regional partners through the Alaska Community Foundation, responds to recent severe storms, including Typhoon Halong, that caused record flooding, extreme winds, and widespread damage across western Alaska from Kwigillingok to Kotzebue. The fund will support affected communities with immediate relief, recovery efforts, and long-term resilience, including disaster preparedness, with distribution guided by regional leaders to ensure aid meets locally identified needs.

minister search *update*



News from the Ministerial Search Committee

We have begun this year's search for a minister with the UUFB board guiding the search with the support of an active search committee. The current search committee members are Carolyn B., Chair, Dick C., Anna J., and Laura M. along with board members Kaylin G., Co-President, and Lisa B., Vice President.

On Sunday, October 26th, Kaylin shared an overview of our ministerial history and plans for the current search in a town meeting of the fellowship. We have challenges in our search of geography, affordability, and availability of ministers. For a UU minister in Montana other UU colleagues are far away. We also understand that the cost of living in Bozeman is a barrier in our search. Last year more UU congregations were looking for a minister than ministers searching for a congregation to serve. This leads us to consider widening our search to include ministers not associated with the Unitarian Universalist Association, "non-UU ministers." In discussion those present supported the proposal while maintaining our unique identity. We have experience with this. Lois Van Leer, our first settled minister, was a minister with the UCC (United Church of Christ) when she joined us in 2003. After a long process of working with the Ministerial Fellowship Committee of the UUA, Lois was approved as a UU Minister and ordained by our congregation. "Lois was great, we loved her" was the first comment given in the discussion at the town hall. Others shared their positive experiences with ministers from other denominations serving congregations in Maine, Alaska, and North Carolina.

The search committee is currently preparing information about our congregation and details about our position for ministers to learn more about us. We seek to attract applicants who are interested in serving our congregation and living with us in Bozeman. The active phase of the search begins in December.
