Our Woven Faith theme for this month is Interdependence: We honor the interdependent web of all existence and acknowledge our place in it.

September 6, 2026 • "Interdependence" with Rev. Charlotte Lehmann

This worship service begins our use of the UUA's new Lifespan Faith Curricular Series "Woven Faith." The themes during this initial year center around our shared values. We will be intentionally incorporating our UU values into UUFB's congregational life starting with Interdependence. Simply stated, "We honor the interdependent web of all existence and acknowledge our place in it."

September 13, 2026 • "Water Communion Service" with Rev. Charlotte Lehmann

You may have heard the phrase "Water is Life" at some time in the past 20 years. In this multigenerational worship service, which will include music, ritual, story, and reading, we reflect on how water connects us. Bring a little sample of water to contribute to our 'merging of the waters' ceremony.

September 20, 2026 • "Harvest: The Central Sacred Practice of Life on Earth" with Rev. Karyl Huntley-Sadler

At this holy time of the ancient harvest holiday of Mabon we celebrate the harvest in the fields and in our lives. The twin blessings of abundance and sacrifice are central to harvest time. The blessing of balance is also celebrated at this point in the turning of the year, as is the preparation of turning within as we move into the darkening time of the sacred cycle.

After 30 years in active pulpit ministry with Centers for Spiritual Living, serving three communities, Karyl Huntley-Sadler retired in 2019 and moved to rural England, where she writes, counsels, and continues her spiritual expression in a Church of England church, ringing 600-year-old bells on Sunday mornings. Previously a high school teacher and college textbook publisher, Karyl has lived on both U.S. coasts and traveled extensively, including leading sacred-site tours in Great Britain and Europe for 10 years. She is especially known for her expertise in creating meaningful rituals and ceremonies for sacred, educational, community, and family settings. She taught ritual to ministerial students and students worldwide and served Centers for Spiritual Living nationally in ritual creation. She is the author of *Real Life Rituals* and *Celebrate with Ritual*, exploring the power and purpose of ritual.

September 27, 2026 • "What Keeps You Connected?" with Rev. Charlotte Lehmann

Some say that desperate times call for desperate measures, but actually what we need to do is hold onto our connections through our embodiment of "Fierce Grace." When you find yourself experiencing challenges of any kind, what keeps you connected?

MINISTER MUSINGS

REV. CHARLOTTE LEHMANN

Wow! It's been a whirlwind of a month and then some...

First off, your welcome of me to Bozeman and to UUFB has been entirely in character based on my experience with the Ministerial Search Committee's handling of our complex UUA search process: intentional, thoughtful, and generous! The appearance of a literal welcome wagon at the end of the service on August 2nd, and the plethora of the cards, accoutrements, and gifts, was and is really impressive, not only to me, but to my friends and community. And I haven't either gotten to go through or make use of everything yet or to individually thank all who contributed to this welcome!

I am especially grateful to those who have really gone above and beyond with their generosity of time and resources. You know who you are! I could call you out, but I'll refrain.

It has been a busy start-up month. I've been attending various meetings and getting to meet a lot of people. It's enough to make my head spin at times.

I have found an apartment and now am awaiting the scheduling by the moving company of the transportation and delivery of my belongings to here. It has been delayed by matters beyond either their or my control.

Getting everything transferred, set up, and going smoothly will continue to take up time. There's an awful lot of logistics to deal with, and it can be frustrating at times, in addition to being time-consuming.

Sunday services this year will make use of a new UUA theme-based whole church curriculum called Woven Faith. During this pilot year, there is no cost to registrants. It covers ALL aspects of congregational life: worship, lifespan faith formation, hospitality and membership, and much more. The focus over the next nine months is on our Shared UU Values. We begin in September with "Interdependence." We have some really special services arranged for this autumn.

Our Lifespan Religious Exploration program is looking into offering OWL for Adults as well as other programming that will be fresh and new to UUFB.

I have begun a Year Long Transitional Ministry Training (YLMT) program offered by the UUA's Transitions Office. This training recognizes that there are transitions happening in every congregation and type of ministry; contract ministers were encouraged to participate. The YLTMT includes a 5-day in-person gathering in Montgomery, AL, in October; I will be away from 10/19-10/23.

I will also be away for a week this month (9/15-9/21): I was invited to participate in the 150th Anniversary Celebration of the First Universalist Church – UU in Auburn, ME, where I was ordained in 2017.

My work week typically is Tuesday-Friday from 9 am to 5 pm, plus some evening meetings. I will be out of the pulpit and not attending the worship service one Sunday each month. My regular Sabbath Day is Mondays, and except for when a fellowship event or special meeting requires differently, I normally am not working on Saturdays. Feel free to email me or call to set up a meeting with me if you have any concerns or celebrations that you'd like to talk over with me.

BOARD REPORT

August has been a month of beginnings for the UUFB Board. We welcomed Rev. Charlotte Lehmann to UUFB and had the joy of gathering for their first service on August 16. At our August 20 meeting, Rev. Charlotte brought the Board their first Minister's Report, covering a remarkably full three weeks.

At that same meeting, we authorized a search committee for a new pianist. Laurel Y.'s retirement leaves a role that shapes how we worship together, and we are grateful to Sandra Ol for pulling a committee together so quickly. Kim H., Lisa T., Sara W., and Jeanne M. have agreed to serve. Megan Makeever will consult with the committee as it shapes a job description and advertises the position. A task force will discuss how best to structure our music program in the years ahead.

The Board also approved the purchase of a new television and microphone system, \$4,100 in total. Our old TV had broken, and the new TV is already installed and in use. The new wireless microphone system, which was recommended by the Sunday Services Committee, has been installed and will enhance the worship experience for both in-person and online attendees.

Much of the August Board meeting focused on the fall stewardship campaign and the development of the 2027 budget. Dave Rockafellow (Treasurer) and Bruce DePriester (Finance Committee Chair) walked us through the 2026 Financial Review and how our annual budget comes together. A first draft of the 2027 budget foresees an increase in staff spending as we (happily) return to full-time ministry.

The Board and minister will engage in a full-day Board retreat on September 12, and our regular September meeting (to be held this month by Zoom) is September 17 at 12:30 pm.

New Woven Faith Curricular Series

UUFB is engaging with a new curricular series called Woven Faith, developed by the UUA and consultant religious educators. Provided in a monthly theme-based ministry format, the resources provide a wide array of ways we can engage around the theme, including worship, classroom lessons for children, small group ministry for youth through older adults, all ages fellowship activities, as well as activities for boards and committees, inclusion and belonging ministries, and justice ministries.

This year, the themes center around the UU shared values, as follows:

- September: Interdependence
- October: Living the Questions
- November: Covenant
- December: Pluralism
- January: Courageous Love
- February: Equity
- March: Transformation
- April: Generosity
- May: Expressing Our Faith
- June: Justice



This is the inaugural and pilot year for Woven Faith, so the developers are also still learning! They want to hear from us how things worked in our congregation.

If you're interested in helping us pilot and implement the full range of resources, please contact our Office Administrator. This curriculum focuses on a way of engaging the whole congregation and helping us realize a strongly connected "Community of Communities." We have faith this curriculum will help us ground in our UU values and theologies, help us hone the skills for right relationships in our congregation, and to do the work of justice in our wider community.

What We Weave:

Threads of Theology and Pedagogy

As we explore Interdependence this month we are weaving with at least five threads from our living Unitarian Universalist tradition.

Thread One: The Transcendentalists

The second generation of American Unitarians included the rebellious and radical innovators known as the Transcendentalists. In their own time most of them stepped outside of Unitarianism, but in the end UUism shifted to embrace their philosophy and include it in our sources. Theologically the Transcendentalists move us toward interdependence with their embrace of nature as a source of inspiration at least equal (if not greater than) scripture. And pedagogically the Transcendentalists experimented with experiential and dialogical methods that shifted us toward co-learning. This thread continues to re-weave itself into our tradition as we find inspiration from nature and each other.

Thread Two: Sophia Lyon Fahs

The early 20th century was a dynamic time in learning theory and pedagogical experimentation. While Maria Montessori and John Dewey were experimenting with child-led and experiential education, Sophia Lyon Fahs was doing the same within the context of Unitarian religious education. Fahs introduced the study of natural objects and everyday life, rather than relying solely on scripture and catechism as the curriculum. She also sought to learn from the children rather than simply instructing them, and with her writings and curriculum she left a lasting impact on Unitarian Universalism. When we remember to respect the contributions of people of all ages, including our children, in our congregations we are re-weaving this thread into our faith tradition.

Thread Three: The 7th Principle

In the 1970's and 80's the UU Womens Federation provided the push to re-examine and reform what was then the Six Principles of Unitarian Universalism. When the Principles were revised the 7th Principle was added "Respect for the Interdependent Web of All Existence of Which We Are a Part". This principle explicitly introduced interdependence as a core value for the tradition. Generations of UU young people grew up with curricula that centered environmental care and human mutuality as part of a UU identity. This thread remains a strong core within our weaving.

Thread Four: Article II and Our Shared Values

As a living tradition UUism makes a practice of returning to re-examine our shared values on a regular basis. In June of 2024 a new Article II was adopted at the General Assembly, giving us our new shared values, now with the addition of covenant language that gives us the verbs for how we will live those values together. Here is what we covenant to do for Interdependence: We covenant to protect Earth and all beings from exploitation. We will create and nurture sustainable relationships of care and respect, mutuality and justice. We will work to repair harm and damaged relationships. This larger articulation of how we can put our values into action is a new thread to add to our weaving of faith formation for all.

Thread Five: Covenant

Our religious ancestors in America were the early pilgrims who came and founded towns and churches that they based on mutual agreements, much like our modern covenants. In the mid-twentieth century the practice of covenanting was reintroduced to Unitarian congregations by James Luther Adams. Adams had seen the inability of churches and other institutions to resist Nazism, and was seeking ways to strengthen voluntary association and create communities of resistance. Covenanting is the spiritual practice and practical tool that he believed could bring individuals together into a We that would be strong and resilient even in the face of challenge. We reweave this thread into our faith formation journey each year as classroom covenants are created.

FamilyPromise
of Gallatin Valley

Family Promise will be the recipient of our September 2nd Sunday donations. The money we donate will be put into their general fund and used to support all their services. That list is long and the names of some of the programs have changed.

- **Diversion and Prevention** – Family Promise works to help families avoid the trauma of losing their housing. Case managers work with families to mediate with landlords, provide financial help for utilities, security deposits and rent.
- **Transitional Housing** – The transitional housing program provides temporary accommodations to families experiencing homelessness and enables them to stay together as they work to regain independence. This program is the one we previously knew as emergency housing.
- **Bridge Housing** – This program helps families that are ready to move out of emergency housing. Currently there are ten housing units at the Journey Home campus. Bridge housing rent begins at below market rate (\$500) and increases every three months. The goal is that each family pays near the market rate for rent by the time they are ready to leave the bridge housing program and so are ready to move on to housing in the community.
- **Workforce Housing** – There are five workforce housing units on the Journey Home campus that provide affordable living options for families working in essential sectors in our community. It helps stabilize the workforce, making it easier for employees to live near their jobs, reducing commute times, and enhancing overall quality of life.
- **Rising Stars** – provides day care and education for children so that families can work.

All this work requires money to continue paying the mortgage for the Journey Home campus and for staff. Please be generous on September 13 as we continue UUFB's support of this worthy venture.
